


## BLACK'S OUT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

Halifax or Eastport was the Situation Last Night in Bowling Classic—Disagreement Over a Score.

The Brunswick-Balke-Clendinning trophy, emblematic of the championship of the Maritime Provinces and Eastern Maine, is due to leave St. John as a result of the game played in the tournament yesterday which left the Eastport and Halifax teams fighting for first place. A loss by Black's ally team, defenders of the trophy, to Eastport and a decision arrived at during the meeting of the captains of the teams, Black's out of the running. The meeting was called as a result of a protest presented on behalf of the Halifax team to deal with a disagreement which arose after a match between Halifax and Black's on Tuesday. When this game was drawing to a close, Thomas Wilson, manager of Black's alley, was taking down the official scores and while tabulating the totals credited Black's with a grand total of 1494 and Halifax 1426. At the time he was receiving scores from all four alleys and a friend who was assisting him informed him that he was wrong in the grand total for Black's as they had figured only 1424 on the black boards and thus Halifax won. Without consulting Mr. Wilson changed his total and later a man who had taken the scores off the black boards told him that Black's had won and not lost as announced. Mr. Wilson consulted his official scores again and found that his original figures 1494 were correct. He called the attention of the Halifax players to the mistake and at that time it is declared, this was acknowledged to be right.

That night the players of the Halifax team held a meeting with other captains and it was decided to enter a protest. This meeting was held yesterday and some of the representatives of the visiting teams pointed out that some of the scores could be changed to bring the total to 1424. The official score card was produced and shown that no erasures had taken place with the exception of changing the figure three to two as explained. This, however, was not satisfactory and Mr. Black said he would wash his hands of the whole matter and abide by any decision of the meeting. He wanted to know, however, from whose score the ten pins would be taken. The question put to the meeting was whether the game would be awarded to Halifax or played over. Five voted in favor of Halifax and three that it be played over. Mr. Black felt that if the Halifax team was dissatisfied, the score should

stand as officially recorded or the game should be played over again. He could not see what right Halifax had to the game. This was the only unpleasant occurrence which arose to mar the tournament, which is conceded to be one of the best ever held in this city. The game early last evening between Black's and Eastport was one of the best of the tournament and was witnessed by a capacity house. Hundreds of fans were on hand and the cheering was deafening. In the first string Eastport established a lead of fifty-seven pins, but in the second Black's came back strong and jumped into the

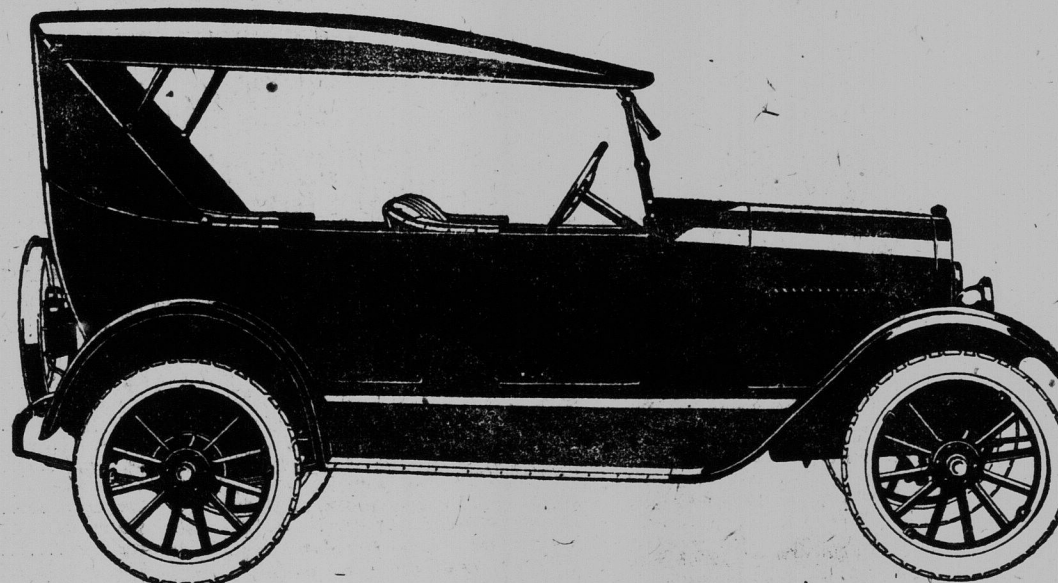

**ROMAN THEATRE, BUILT 1800 YRS. AGO, DUG UP**  
Rome, April 26.—Professor Bartoli, archaeologist of the University of Rome, announces the discovery at Ferentino, the Etruscan city that was the birthplace of Emperor Otho, of an ancient theatre of the second century after Christ, which contains the remains of beautiful statues.  
Ferentino is near the ruins of the ancient Ferentinum. The town has been noted for years as containing an ancient unexcavated theatre, considered the most perfect in Italy as regards its stage structure. The back wall of the stage is 136 feet long and has seven doors. It is believed to be Etruscan. The theatre is surrounded by a semicircle of beautiful arches.  
The principals of the city schools have received a draft of a new text for the teaching of natural science in grade eight. The text comes from the provincial director of elementary agricultural education, A. C. Gorham, and accompanying it is a list of questions regarding the experience of the teacher in giving nature study instruction.
