MORNING NEWS

OVER THE WIRES

F. P. Merrill, general manager of the Dominion Steel Corporation, announced yesterday that the steel mill would open on Tuesday or Wednesday. This includes the mill and wire fence department. One hundred and fifty men will be employed, and this is taken as an indication that the steel business is improving.

Every miner will be provided with four days a week, according to an agreement reached at Springfield, yesterday, between the Dominion Coal Company and the miners' union.

According to a dispatch yesterday from Ottawa, the governor-in-council has commuted the sentence of death passed upon Wilfred McHugh of Westwotworth, by Chief Justice Sir William Hughes, to life imprisonment.

THE COST OF LABOR IN BUILDING CONSTRUCTION

There has been and continues to be a more or less vague and unsatisfactory discussion of the labor cost in building construction. We all know that wages are abnormally high, just as we all know that the cost of materials and the cost of living are high. The high cost of materials is dependent upon the first, just how far dependent is made apparent by some valuable figures recently published by the Hoover Committee on the Elimination of Waste.

"In the last analysis the great bulk of the 100 per cent, which represents a completed building is made up largely of labor, with small increments for the value of the raw material in its original state and the use of funds for carrying on the development of this material."

From figures at hand we estimate the direct labor entering into the construction of the building, together with labor in manufacture of materials and equipment and transportation, to be at least 78 per cent. Carrying this a step further to include the indirect labor, which is made of clerical work and general supervision from the home office, salesmen's salaries, etc., would add another 10 per cent, making the total direct and indirect labor some 88 per cent of the total cost of the building.

These facts, while they have undoubtedly made many investors hesitate, have in a measure made it evident to many that waiting is likely to be as much of a losing game as any possible present risk. No matter what the immediate future may hold in possible readjustments, they will not be sufficient to deny for a long time a profitable return on the present building—Architecture.

REDOUTENSAAL IS THEATRE NOW

The most beautiful theatre in the
world today, as many good judges think,
is not in Paris nor in London nor in
Berlin. It is in Vienna. And from this
any one would probably guess that it
is the noted Burgtheater, now known as
the State Theatre. But it is, in fact,
the internationally famous Redoutensaal,
or Ball Room, of the Hofburg, or Royal
Palace, which has been converted into
a theatre for the performance of plays
that are not suitable for the State
Theatre.

When Maria Theresa, Queen of Hun-
gary and Bohemia and Archduchess of
Austria, submitted her plans to the com-
missioners of the eighteenth century, she
added a clause that must have delighted
those who at that time erected theatres.
It ran as follows: "Expenses are not
to be taken into consideration."

Her request was granted. It is most
spacious hall. Its walls are hung
with priceless Gobelin, Venetian
tapestries of unusual brilliancy and
the ceiling, for the dances that were

still new, Mozart and Beethoven wrote

BURMA IS DEAD MAN'S LAND.

Strange Beliefs of Natives, Who Hold
That Vampires Swarm Around Them.

Burma is the land of evil spirits.
When a Burman dies, his soul is sup-
posed to be so disappointed at leaving
this life that it becomes a demon, lives
in a tree and must constantly be given
presents of food and drink if it is to be
prevented from wreaking its evil will
upon the peasants of the neighborhood.

Women who have died and left an in-
fant behind them are said to grow into
a species of vampire, which they call
swanhs, and should the child perish
also, it is supposed to accompany the
evil ghost in its hauntings. The spirits
of dead children, too, are believed to in-
habit the bodies of cats and dogs, writes
Sirdar Ikkal Ali Shah, F.R.A.S., in
"The Occult Law of Burma," an article
in the September Occult Review.

After a while the vampire is thought
of as consisting merely of a head and
organs, which float behind it like a
ghostly flag. These horrible things
haunt the woods and roads at nightfall,
and may suddenly drop from the
branches of a tree upon the shoulders of
the wayfarer, and fastening upon his
throat, drink his life-blood.

A separate class, known as the wea
or neocomancers, has arisen to act as in-
termediaries between the human race
and the numerous spirits which swarm
around them; and on the Chindwin River,
in Lower Burma, is a village inhabited
solely by wizards and neocomancers
where many pilgrims go to have the ef-
fects of bewitchment removed.

A terrible silence broods over the vil-
lage by day. But the night is made
hideous with the sound of gongs and the
wild chanting of the wizards, invoking
the spirits of the dead to appear.

Many animals, too, are regarded as
wizards or evil spirits. Tigers are
thought to be evil creatures, whose
whiskers are exceedingly poisonous.
Elephants are looked upon almost as

sacred, and monkeys are never destroyed.
Should a butterfly enter the house it is
considered unlucky, as it may be a spi-
rit or departed spirit, but the appea-
rance of a grasshopper is hailed with de-
light as a good omen.

The consummate contribution of the
