The detectives are working quietly on the case of an Overland automobile which plunged into the excavated area at the foot of Waterloo street yesterday morning but have nothing to report this morning. Coughlan, and investigations are being made to ascertain how the occupants of the Overland came into possession of these parts. GOOD PROSPECTS FOR THE TOURIST ANNUAL MEETING.
Prospects are bright for a good attendance at the annual session of the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association which will be held in Sackville on June 22 and 23. The delegates will leave the city at noon on Wednesday and will return early Friday morning. One session will be held on arrival on Wednesday evening and another business session on Thursday morning. The afternoon will be devoted to a drive to points of interest in the surrounding country and in the evening there will be a public meeting in the Imperial Theatre. Harry Allen of Fredericton, president of the quizer association of the province, will probably be present and show some films depicting the great natural resources and opportunities of New Brunswick. Hon. Peter J. Veniot has also been invited to present.

WILD BERRIES IN MARKET; 60 CENTS.
A small consignment of wild strawberries appeared in the market this morning and were sold at 60 cents a box before 10 o'clock. This is very early for wild berries but it is expected that there will be a few boxes for sale in the market every morning. The native cultivated berries sold at 50 cents a box. There were some nice looking turkeys in the market this morning selling at 60 cents a pound.

The prevailing prices for other commodities were as follows: Beef, 20-25 cents a lb.; Mutton, 20-30 cents; pork, 25-35 cents; veal, 12-20 cents; lamb, 30-40 cents; chickens, \$2.50 to \$3.50 a pair; fowl, 50 cents a pair; butter, 30-35 cents; eggs, 35-40 cents; bacon, 50 cents; parsnips, 60 cents a peck; carrots, 15 cents a bunch; beets, 15 cents a bunch; lettuce, 10 cents; radishes, 10 cents a bunch and cabbage, 10 cents a pound.

KERR PUT BRAKES ON BABE RUTH

Sluggers were Having a Record Week.

Now Has 23 Home Runs to Credit—McHenry Climbing Up on Hornsby for Leadership in the National League.

Chicago, June 18.—Babe Ruth and Dick Kerr, White Sox pitcher, share the honors in the American League averages released today, which includes games of Wednesday. The Babe broke all hitting records and Kerr stopped the mighty sluggers when he seemed on an endless home run streak.

Ruth shattered all records by driving out seven homers in five games, one establishing a new mark for distance, its estimated being 475 feet, and gathered enough shorter hits to bring his average from .348 to .375. This placed him well to the front in the players who have been in thirty or more games. Then he faced Kerr and his home run streak was broken. Ruth has twenty-three homers and was 16 days ahead of his last season's mark on Wednesday.

All the leaders of a week ago suffered slight batting slumps, except Ruth, Harry Hellman of Detroit, continues to hold the lead with .421, while Tris Speaker, pilot of the Cleveland, world's champions, continued to be the runner-up with .374. Cobb is third with .364, while Sisler is trailing with .290.

The St. Louis man broke up the race for stolen base honors, which Rice and Harris of Washington, were having a week ago. Sisler has passed the pair and is leading with fourteen thefts. The Washington pair failed to add to their string and have a dozen each.

Other leading batters: Severoid, St. Louis, .362; Williams, St. Louis, .374; Ruth, New York, .375; Whit, Philadelphia, .369; R. Jones, Detroit, .360; Gharney, Washington, .358; E. Collins, Chicago, .353.

The National.
A. McHenry, slugging outfielder of the St. Louis Cardinals, is making rapid strides toward the top in the National League batting race, and is pushing his team mate, Hornsby, for the lead. Hornsby suffered a slight slump and dropped from .424 a week ago to .410 which retains the lead for him. McHenry boosted his average from .382 to .401.

Man and Fournier, two other Cardinals, went on a batting rampage for an average of .388, while the Frenchman advanced eighteen points to an average of .368, putting him in fourth place.

Emil Meusel, slugging Philadelphia outfielder, is topping the National League circuit's hitters with eleven home runs, having added one to his string during the past week. Max Carey, a fleet footed Pittsburgh outfielder is drawing his old time form on the cuspids, and has snatched the lead from Frisch, a total of 18 to the New York star's 15.

New York, June 18.—Two base hits figured prominently in the major league games yesterday. Nine were batted in the first Detroit-Boston game, in which Cobb and Veaseh of the Tigers each made two. Six were divided evenly between the New York and Chicago National League clubs, and four were batted in the Philadelphia-Cincinnati game and the second Detroit-Boston contest.

Mike Menosky of the Boston Americans, celebrated Bunker Hill day yesterday. The outfielder scored seven of the eleven runs the Red Sox made in the double header—a home run, two singles, a double and a single in six times at bat—and walked three times. His bat was partly responsible for the double defeat of Detroit, which has now lost seven straight games. Pitcher Ethuk of the Tigers was charged with the loss of both games. All the Boston National players made one or more hits in their shut-out victory over St. Louis. Home runs were made by Outfielder Rowell, who had four hits, and by Pitcher Inglin, who held the Cardinals to four hits.
