MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Henry Bourassa, the Nationalist leader, left Montreal last evening for New York en route for Europe. He will spend about six weeks in France and Italy.

In the police court in Fredericton yesterday Daisy Wilson, formerly of St. John, was fined \$100 for conducting a disorderly house. A man found in the house was fined \$50. A druggist was fined \$50 for violation of the Scott Act and sentenced to one month imprisonment for a third offence. The latter case will be appealed.

The accounts of the late Mrs. Julius Inches were passed in the York county probate court yesterday. Receipts amounting to \$2,700 were shown. Dr. P. K. Inches, of St. John, was present as executor.

Through the generosity of an unknown donor the policemen of New York will receive turkeys. There will be \$200 distributed, costing the donor about \$10,000.

Coal shipments to the St. Lawrence from Sydney closed yesterday with the despatch of the steamers Kron Prinz Olaf and Fritz.

The coroner's jury in the inquest on the body of Edward McGregor, of Digby, yesterday brought in a verdict that death was caused by a blow from an axe found near the body, by some person or persons unknown. They recommended a thorough and searching investigation. The axe was identified by William Tcho, brother of the man under arrest, as his property.

Montreal, Nov. 21—Directors of the Royal Bank of Canada today declared a dividend at the increased rate of 12 per cent per annum. For some time the bank rate has been 11 per cent.

Mrs. Irene Dole, of Gorham, N. H., who is 88 years old, has made and presented to a friend a patchwork quilt containing 113 pieces, some of them hand-painted by herself.

SARDINE FISHING HAS BEEN FAILURE

Story of Big Prices Declared Absurd—Hard Winter Outlook

Discussing the sardine fishing today, James A. Belys, K. C., president of the Charlotte County Weir Owners' Association, said that a story published some days ago to the effect that fishermen were getting a big price for hogshead for sardines as a result of a quarrel between the Eastport and Lubec fishermen was untrue.

"It is perfectly absurd, and the person who wrote it knew absolutely nothing about the conditions prevailing," said Mr. Belys. The sardine fishing this year, he said, had been a failure. There were some cases, he said, where as high as \$30 a hogshead was paid, but this was for a larger herring which in any case would command a good price. As to any harvest that was being made, he said that the season was already closed for sardines, and there were none to be had.

A peculiar feature, Mr. Belys said, was that there were plenty of fish but for some unaccountable reason the schools of fish kept away from the nets. There were banks of fish off the Wolves, but they were driven away by the silver hake and codfish.

At Deer Island, N. B., there would, he thought, be much distress this winter on account of the collapse of the fish industry. This same condition applied to Grand Island, Back Bay and other places where the fish catch was usually plentiful, and suffering must result.

REPORTS SUBMITTED TO PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

Ottawa, Nov. 21—A number of annual reports were submitted to the house today and parliament now has every annual report, a thing which measuring occurred before the opening of the house. In the report of the auditor general it is recommended that the annual report be amended or its provisions simplified. This is in reference to classification of senate officials.

The superintendent of insurance reports for the year ending Dec. 1, 1909, fire insurance companies doing business in Canada received in premiums, \$17,040,474 and paid out for losses, \$8,646,828. In life insurance the total amount of policies taken in Canada during the year was \$13,730,078, an increase of \$31,842,872 over 1908.

According to the marine department the book the total number of vessels on the register of Canada at the close of last year was 7,762, measuring 718,232 tons, an increase of 100 vessels and 16,229 tons. The total net registered tonnage of Canada is estimated at \$21,550,000, new vessels built during the year \$1,138,777.

The annual report of the fisheries department shows total value of all kinds of fish and fish products taken by Canadian fishermen during the last fiscal year was \$22,029,169. This is \$4,178,084 ahead of 1908 and \$140,017 better than 1909, which was the previous record.

Charters and supplementary letters patent for federally incorporated companies numbered 403, representing a total capitalization of \$348,377,800, far in excess of any previous year.

During the year naturalization papers were taken out by 16,350 aliens. The militia count for the year shows 191 officers and 2,622 rank and file on the permanent force. At the close of the fiscal year the numbers of garrized cadet corps had reached 213, with a membership of close on 15,000 boys.
