

## PLANS MADE FOR OTTAWA APPEAL FOR PORTS' USE

Speakers Chosen to Solicit Aid From Other Province Trade Boards

TWO SPECIAL TRAINS LIKELY TO BE USED

City and Municipal Councils May Form Part of Delegation.

Detailed plans for the New Brunswick appeal to Ottawa to take up the matter of a fuller use of Canadian ports for import and export were arranged this morning at a meeting of the ways and means committee, City Council and council of the Board of Trade, held in the Board of Trade, held in the absence of Mayor Potts, Hon. R. W. Wigmore was in the chair.

Speakers Are Named.

It was arranged that W. E. Anderson would address the Moncton, Chatham and Newcastle boards of trade, A. H. Wetmore the Fredericton board, G. L. Warwick the Woodstock board, and D. W. Ledingham the Campbellton and Bathurst boards. Mr. Ledingham will leave tomorrow for Moncton. Lt.-Col. A. E. Massie will make the necessary arrangements for meetings.

G. L. Warwick was appointed chairman of the transportation committee.

A. J. Gray, of the C. N. R., and G. Bruce Burpee and C. D. Strong, of the C. N. R., promised to furnish the committee with a schedule of rates.

Plans For Journey.

No reply has been received yet from Ottawa as to whether February 26 would be suitable for the delegation to come to interview the Government. It is expected that two special trains will be needed to carry the delegates.

Whole Council May Go.

It was stated by Commissioner Wigmore that in all probability the City Council and the Municipal Council would go in a body.

W. S. Allison and R. D. Paterson were appointed a committee to arrange a good representation from this city.

A letter will be sent to each member of the Board of Trade asking support for the movement, and every member present undertook to write to their travelers and representatives in the province urging them to work for a representative delegation from the province.

T. H. Estabrook agreed to interview the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at Toronto and try to obtain its support.

## Union Street Week-End Break Nets Thieves Loot of \$1,200

Forty-five Suits, Six Suit Cases Stolen From M. Ketiff's.

One of the biggest robberies perpetrated in this city of late came to light this morning when it was learned that Margolia Ketiff's store in Union street had been broken into and 45 suits of clothing and six suit cases stolen. The value of the suits averaged between \$25 and \$80 and the total value of the clothing and suit cases aggregated over \$1,200.

Police At Work.

The break was made sometime between Saturday night and early Sunday morning. An entrance to the store was made from the rear of the premises and owing to the quantity of goods, their bulk and weight it is felt that it was the work of several men. The store is managed by Abraham Miller and he reported the matter to the police, who are now investigating.

"I beg to inform you that I have today received advices from the foreign minister of my government, to the effect that, while our consulates in Canada remain temporarily closed, the sanitary authorities of Mexico will consider as cleared a bill of health of vessels sailing from Canadian ports bound for Mexico, when such bills of health are issued by this Consulate General in the case of official ports of Canada."
