under their care against corrupt conversation and the reading of pernicious books.

4th. Most Friends are diligent in reading the Holy

Scriptures in their families collectively.

5th. Friends avoid the use of intoxicating drinks, except for purposes strictly medicinal, and are clear of frequenting taverns and of attending places of diversion, as far as we know.

6th. The circumstances of the poor and of those likely to require assistance are duly inspected and relief afforded them; they are advised and assisted in suitable employments, and their children and all others under our care are being properly educated for the ordinary duries of life

7th. Friends are clear of complying with military requisitions and of paying any fine or tax instead thereof.

8th. Friends appear to be just in their dealings, and punctual in fulfilling their engagements, and careful to conduct their business as becomes our religious profession. When any give occasion for fear on these accounts they are seasonably labored with for their preservation and recovery.

Care is mostly taken seasonably to deal with offenders in the spirit of meekness and agreeably to our

discipline.
