REARRESTED FOR OTTAWA POLICE

MOSES LEVITT, ALIAS HARRY RALPH, THE MAGAZINE CANVASSEER MUST ANSWER ANOTHER CHARGE OF OBTAINING MONEY UNDER FALSE PRETENSES.

He is wanted at Ottawa in connection with his work last September as a canvasser for the "Canadian Countryman."

Levitt, according to his own statements, has had a checkered career for a young man. His vocations have been varied. He stated he had worked as a book-keeper, a typist, a reporter, a clothing salesman, a magazine canvasser, a newspaper reporter, and had also been on the stage as a monologue artist. He appears to be well educated, has a glib tongue, and boasted of his persuasive power as a magazine canvasser.

WORK TO BE DONE AT OXFORD PARK

RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT THAT IS BEING OPENED UP—PROGRESSIVE IDEAS ARE BEING FOLLOWED.

Progressive ideas on an extensive scale will be adhered to in the opening up of "Oxford Park," Ingersoll's new north-end residential district by Mr. S. S. Saunders, who recently acquired the tract of land. The land which fronts immediately to the northwest of the corporation line is for the greater part very level.

A number of these lots have been sold, and it is expected that at least four houses will be erected during the coming summer. It is the intention which will be known as First, Second, Third and Fourth streets. The streets will run north and south, while on the north side of the property, running east and west will be an avenue, the name of which has not yet been definitely decided upon.

That it is the intention to have all the work on the property done in accordance with up-to-date methods is apparent from the plans outlined to a Chronicle representative by Mr. Saunders. The contract has already been let for the construction of five thousand feet of cement sidewalk, and arrangements are being made to have the water and gas pipes laid, so that when the permanent streets are put down it will not be necessary to dig them up. The reporter was informed that one party was contemplating the purchase of the entire property east of First street, which means fifteen lots.

In addition to the other work mentioned that will be undertaken as quickly as possible, provision is made in the plans for a boulevard and numerous flower beds, which will add much to the natural beauty.

It has already been noted with such encouraging success that he considers the prospects bright for material development in Ingersoll.

HANDSOME GIFTS FROM ALLIANCE

TO THE EX-PRESIDENT, MR. JOSEPH GIBSON AND MRS. GIBSON AT FINAL SESSION OF THE BIG CONVENTION.

At the closing session of the Convention of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance at Toronto, Thursday night, Mr. Joseph Gibson, the retiring President, and Mrs. Gibson were both highly honored. Mr. Gibson was presented with an illuminated address and a handsome gold watch as marks of sincere appreciation of his energetic service, while Mrs. Gibson was made the recipient of an elegant clock and bouquet of "American Beauties." The presentations were made on behalf of the Executive and staff of the Alliance for the yeoman service rendered by Mr. and Mrs. Gibson during their forty-five years of membership.

As they rose to their feet the large audience rose and sang "He's a Jolly Good Fellow," then gave three cheers and a tiger. Mr. Gibson made a speech of acceptance, brim full of his ready wit. He delivered an oration on the "Happiness of Married Life."

Mr. Gibson returned last night from Toronto and discussing the action of the Convention said: "The policy of the Alliance for the last ten years has been banishment of the bar and treatment of the liquor traffic, and the introduction of such legislation as would reduce the traffic so as to produce the least possible harm."

"That is substantially the platform of Mr. Rowell, Mr. Rowell has therefore come over to our standard, not Alliance to his standard, and therefore to be loyal to our position we were necessarily called upon to support the Rowell standard and all candidates, be they Reform or Conservative, who refuse to measure up to at least to that standard, cannot expect our support."

Mr. Gibson spoke very appreciatively of the kindness shown him by Mrs. Gibson by the Alliance. He is particularly delighted with the tribute to Mrs. Gibson, whose home life, he mentioned, had been sacrificed to some extent on account of her husband being out on the firing line.

Dear Sir,—On behalf of the Prohibition workers of the Province of Ontario in Convention assembled, we have great pleasure in respectfully offering to you hearty congratulations on the splendid results accomplished during the years in which you have been their leader as President of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance.

When you were first chosen to fill that important position, there were 153 municipalities under Local Option. Today the number is 341. The map of Ontario has been changed. The number of liquor-selling places that have been closed is more than 800. The number of permanent employees in the growing Alliance service has risen from four to thirty-two. Our annual income has increased from less than \$15,000.00 to more than \$70,000.00. We have built up a great literature circulation movement and a systematic propaganda, that are having a marvelous effect in the strengthening of the temperance cause and the development of public opinion against the liquor traffic.

For all this, we are profoundly thankful, recognizing in it the blessing of an over-ruling Providence, realizing how far our success has been the result of the educational work of many religious organizations and their cooperation against the liquor traffic, and knowing how much of it has been due to the unwearied efforts of those who have been associated with you in office.

Yet we also feel that your personal interest, your strong advocacy, your energy, zeal, and ability, have been important factors in the great movement which has made such progress; and to you personally we desire to tender our hearty thanks for what you have done in your position as President, and for your inspiring influence in our many councils and campaigns.

We recognize the force of the reasons which you have given for asking us to choose another President. We rejoice in the knowledge that we are still to be favored with your advice and assistance. We earnestly hope that you may long be spared to see a continuing harvest from the seed that you have sown so self-sacrificingly and faithfully. We assure you of our high esteem, our confidence, and our affection; and we tender you this address as a memorial of a relationship and co-operation that have been and will be, a delight to us all.

The address is signed on behalf of the Ontario Alliance by Rev. Charles Green, President, Rev. Ben H. Spencer, Secretary, all of whom are present at the convention and about one thousand of the delegates.

MAKING TOUR OF THE DIOCESE

BISHOP FALLON AT CHURCH OF THE SACRED HEART YESTERDAY—GENEROUS RESPONSE TO APPEAL FOR FUNDS FOR PROPOSED SEMINARY.

Right Rev. Bishop Fallon, of London, paid a visit yesterday to the Church of the Sacred Heart, in his tour of the Diocese for the purpose of securing funds for the building and maintenance of the seminary which will be erected in London in the near future.

In the course of his address Bishop Fallon explained that for a considerable time the idea had been in his mind that the Diocese should have a seminary, but until a year or so ago he could see no means of getting it. At that time a prominent Catholic of London offered to donate a site for it and with this as a starting point he felt that it would not be a very difficult task to secure the funds for the building and maintenance.

The speaker further explained that he wished to appropriate forty per cent of the money collected towards the building and the remaining sixty per cent would be set aside towards endowment of the seminary to provide funds for the maintenance. He also stated that he did not wish to build an elaborate building, in fact he did not want to give the priests in training any better accommodation than they would be provided with after they were ordained and assigned to their several parishes.

Good Accommodation Here.

He cited the fact that very few parishes in his Diocese were so favorably situated as regards the pastor's residence, as Ingersoll.

Bishop Fallon mentioned that there was a shortage of priests, not only in the Diocese of London, but throughout the Dominion and that it was on account of this shortage that he felt some steps were necessary. His appeal for funds was very favorably received, and quite a large subscription was the result of his effort. The subscriptions will be payable in five annual payments.
