SECOND EDITION BISMARCK'S HEALTH. IN THE GREAT CHANCELLOR OF ENGLAND.

A feeling in Berlin that the Great German man is nearing his end. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. London, Jan. 7.—A Berlin correspondent telegraphed that the feeling in the Capital in one of grave anxiety in regard to Prince Bismarck's health. All sorts of rumors are afloat but no one possesses any authentic information on the subject. A report reached Berlin on Sunday that the Prince was actually dying and there was great excitement in consequence, but it was soon contradicted. Many fear the worst and express the belief that Bismarck's strong hand has been felt for the last time in German affairs.

THE BISHOP'S LETTER. Investigation in England over German Candidate. London, Jan. 7.—Since the publication of the letters between Lord Bismarck and Sir R. D. Morier, a strong feeling of indignation has arisen among all classes of the English people. The feeling against Germany is so strong that it is thought it will be impossible for the Government to continue the present arrangement in regard to the blockade of the east coast of Africa with Germany. Public opinion here is utterly opposed to any further alliance with the Germans.
