

TWO MORE STEAMERS

To be Put on by the Beaver Line People.

Government Has Contracted with the Company for Carrying the Mails and the Facilities Will be Doubled—Halfway Telegraphers Looking After the Work Agreement for Next Year—Mr. James Ross Secures Greenway's Railway Project—Montreal News.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—(Special.)—The return to the city of the Beaver Line delegation to Ottawa, and the decision of the Government to give them the subsidy, has created more or less interest in shipping circles, and this interest was increased when it became known that the Beaver Line would be strengthened by two boats leased from the Cunard Company. Mr. James Crutcher, one of the Montreal directors, being interviewed this evening, said that the contract would not be signed till the end of the week, but that the steamers which the Beaver Line is leasing from the Cunards are first-class boats and will sail about 15 knots.

The railway telegraphers' association of Canada has been in session here to-day, and has also had a number of interviews with the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railway officials. The object of the meeting is the renewal of the agreement, with perhaps some modifications, between the telegraphers and the railroads, which agreement expires on Dec. 1 next. No final arrangements had been completed, but it is expected that to-morrow morning will see the renewal of the agreement on terms satisfactory to both sides. Among those attending the sessions at the Albion Hotel are: Messrs. W. H. Allison, Toronto; W. H. Sandhu, North Newburg; W. Trudeau and D. Fortin, Grondines; W. Smeaton, Ottawa; P. D. Hamie, Blue Bonnets, and John Dunn, Montreal.

Mr. James Ross, the millionaire contractor, who has just returned from the west, says regarding the proposed Winnipeg and Duluth Railway scheme: "The enterprise is absurd, and if carried out will bring financial ruin to the province. The friends of the scheme are not the farmers and business men of Manitoba, but rather certain people who have already had dealings with the Manitoba Government." Mr. Ross says that the people will not soon forget the railway which culminated in the entry of the Northern Pacific into Winnipeg, with the result that the Canadian Pacific retained their business and the Northern Pacific got little or no traffic from Manitoba. He added that the Pacific has already commenced with Duluth, and is thus so beneficial to Winnipeg and the province at large that another road should not be subsidized. No doubt, he declares, the province will find that the road will be a burden upon the people of Manitoba.

Mayor Elliot and City Solicitor Wilkes of Brandon interviewed General Munro per Hays today at the removal of the Grand Trunk shops to London. Of course the shops cannot be brought back, but Brandon will be altogether overlooked at the hands of the company.

The annual meeting of the Street Railway Company was held this morning, Senator Forget presiding. The net profits for the year were \$307,855, against \$402,100 last year. Two dividends of four per cent, and a bonus of one per cent, were paid out of this, leaving a balance of \$139,500 to go to the reserve fund. The old board of directors was re-elected.

E. Thoutet & Co., large wholesale importers, have consented to assign on the demand of a Berlin firm, Messrs. C. Co., who are creditors to the extent of \$8,000.

Dufresne & Mongenais say they intend going out of the business anyway, and that the assets more than cover the liabilities. The assets consist in great part of book debts.

A romantic marriage took place here yesterday afternoon, after proving that there is yet left in the world love that can wait for years. Twenty-one years ago, in a little Glenora village, Matthew McCrimmon and Mary Urquhart were betrothed, on the understanding that the engagement would be a long one. Matthew went out to Washington Territory, but fortune did not smile on him for many years. On Monday he arrived here to wed his bride, and wired to her to meet him here. This she did yesterday, and they were married. The meeting between the lovers was very affecting.

The Royal Victoria Hospital will have a new wing, to cost \$100,000. The Atlantic & Lake Superior Railway people expect to have the railway completed along the south shore from Montreal to Levis by next fall.

A new case of smallpox, after several weeks' respite, has developed itself in a St. Catherine-street convent for little girls, and the house has been quarantined.

MR. MCINNES GETS A BOOST

From the Senate to the Lieutenant-Governorship—Mr. Templeton Goes to the Red Chamber.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—It is reported here that Senator McInnes is to be appointed Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, and William Templeman, proprietor of The Times, Victoria, is to be made Senator in his place.

Provincial Post North, Shaw.

Brandon, Nov. 4.—The local Executive of the Ontario Provincial Post and Railway Show, at a meeting held here, looked over the various buildings offered by the city for the use of the exhibit. The Grand Trunk engine were finally selected, and will prove the largest and best adapted for the purpose ever secured in the Province. The building is 345 feet long by 135 feet wide, and has 4,000 feet of floor space. The structure is fitted with complete steam-heating apparatus, by which in case of cold weather, the place can be heated at a total cost of \$40. Arrangements have been completed with the railways for the carriage of exhibits both ways at a one-way rate. Passengers will be given the round trip for a single fare. Up to date the entries are 260 per cent. greater than at the same date in any previous year.

Taken Off by Heart Disease.

Ridgeway, Nov. 3.—George Twigg, aged 70 years, was found dead in bed this morning. He passed yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, not feeling well. Mrs. Twigg saw him last about 9 p.m., and he was apparently sleeping naturally. She retired and heard nothing through the night. On going to his room this morning she found him dead. Coroner's inquest was postponed, and a coroner's jury was called to the scene of the case, concluding that an insect was unnecessary, and that heart failure was the probable cause of death.

FIRST SHOOTING

Nearly Occurred At Dawson City Recently.

The Red-Coat Police Were On Hand And The Shooter Fled Across The Border.

New York, Nov. 5.—William J. Jones writes to the World from Dawson: "For iniquity and vice no city can hope to make a favorable showing alongside of Dawson City. Some 15 or 18 saloons are filled every night with crowds of men and women. The dance halls are brilliantly lighted all night. Every saloon is provided with from six to a score of 'brass' games. The faro dealers have 'boxes' and cases that work double, and when it is necessary to make any certain card win or lose the dealer possesses the skill and tools necessary for such purpose. The percentage at stud poker amounts to from 30 cents to \$1 each deal, and around the table the 'boosters,' to whom the dealers are careful to give the 'flashes' and the highest cards, in brief, the explanation is that the gamblers are reaping a harvest of which they never before dreamed, and the hardworking miners are paying the fiddlers."

FOUGHT OVER A SNAKE.

"The first gun-play, or exhibition of pistols in the hands of drunken or enraged men, to occur in Dawson City, happened the other night. Two old Yukon pioneers, men who had passed several winters in this northern country and had been partners many a time, were partly inebriated. A dispute arose over the charms of an Indian woman. TO SEARCH FOR ANDREE.

Steamer Victoria Provided For An Eight Months Trip.

Christiania, Nov. 5.—The steamer fitted out by the governor of Tromsø, under instructions from King Oscar, which has left Tromsø island in search of Prof. Andree, the missing aeronaut, and his party, is the Victoria.

She carries a crew of 15 men and has on board Paul Bjoerqvist, the explorer. The Victoria is provisioned for eight months, and will search Daumen, Advent Bay, Capt. Thordsen, Prinz Karl Foreland and possibly Dane's island, from which point Andree's balloon ascended in July last in his attempt to cross the Arctic regions.

On her return trip the Victoria will explore the southwest coast of Daumensoeren.
