Causes of **Epidemic**

Secretary of Provincial Board of Health Investigates Reasons of Typhoid.

Defective Sewerage a Fruitful Source of Disease-Chinese Gardens Visited.

A report of great interest to Victorians has been submitted by Dr. Fagan, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, to the Attorney-General, and given out by the latter to the press. Dr. Fagan has gone exhaustively into the causes of the epidemic of typhoid fever from which city is emerging, and his general conclusions will be found to agree with those propounded in an article in the Times a few weeks ago, embodying the results of interviews had by a Times reporter with medical men of the city. While not finding any common cause for fever, the doctor deals at length with the defective sewage arrangements in those residences where contagion was discovered. He also advises the inspec-tion of milk, and draws attention in the strongest possible terms to the loathsome and almost incredible practices of

the Chinese gardeners of the city.

The report of Dr. Fagan only empha sizes recommendations which have been made repeatedly to the city council by medical health officer of the city Dr. Fraser, in which he has urged res along the lines now suggested. The report is as follows:
