ICE IN THE GULF. — The S. S. Enigma, Capt. Davidson, arrived from Quebec at 8 o'clock yesterday morning. She left that port at 4 p. m. on Saturday last, and reached Gaspe at the same hour on Monday. She encountered a great deal of ice in Gaspe Bay, inside of Sand Point, and experienced much difficulty in getting to her wharf there. On the way to Dalhousie she was hindered considerably by floating ice. She left Dalhousie at 7 p. m. on Tuesday last, and at half past ten fell in with ice off Bonaventure, which she did not clear of until one o'clock on Wednesday morning. An hour later she was again surrounded by ice off Bonaventure Island and encountered all the way to Paspébié, of which she was kept; it was broken open by Mr. George Savoy's Pilot boat with materials to render any assistance that may be required in making repairs. It is possible the Enigma may have resumed her voyage before they reach Pleasant Bay.
