ELI PASO, Texas, June 12.—Twelve bodies of flood victims have been recovered at Cilifton, Arizona, but the death list is generally placed at thirtyone. Many of the bodies will never be recovered. Harrowing tales of death are being brought in by people living along Chase Canyon, one man reporting that he had counted twelve people istruggling in the water and believes that all of them were lost. One Mexican woman lost five children who were swept away by the wreckage of her house.

LONDON, June 12.—A special despatch from Belgrade says the bodies of King Alexander and Queen Draga, were buried in a large pit dug in the village of Rakovica, as a mark of ignomy, the bodies of their murdered relatives were placed above them and then the common grave was refilled with earth.

PARIS June 12.— The foreign office here received a despatch today from the French agent on the Servian frontier, confirming the press announcement that the new government at Belgrade had abolished the legislative assembly, created by the late King Alexander, and had renewed the ancient skupehtina, which has been ordered to assemble next. Monday for the purpose of raitifying the proclamation of Prince Peter Karageorgevitch as King. The assembly just abolished was made up of appointees of the late king and did not contain a member who was opposed to Alexander's policy.
