

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons Adopted Clause of War Budget by Great Majority.

LONDON, April 21 .- In the house of commons today, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, the chancellor of the exchequer, in the course of a speech defending the budget proposals, said no-thing could be more premature than the rumors in the press regarding the peace negotiations in South Africa. The income tax resolution was adopted by a vote of 290 to 61.

BOSTON. April 21 .- In the senate today the two-cent-a-mile railroad bill was killed by a rising vote of 3 to 16, after considerable debate.
