These twelve months have been sorrowful ones for our sister, and this decided step by her son is like a gleam of light in a dark place. Camp; 1st Elgin, Rev. S. W. Keirstead; Hopewell, Rev. W. M. Gregor; Rev. B. N. Hughes, Rev. J. C. Steadman, Rev. H. B. B. and Rev. C. W. Williams, were also present and invited to assist. The usual conference preparatory to the despatch of the routine business of the meeting, was one of unusual power and blessing. The quarterly sermon by Rev. E. C. Baker most happily proved helpful to pastors and people. Subject: "The condition on which a church may be successful," founded on Acts 2:42. That of Rev. I. B. Colwell, founded on 1 Peter 1:7, was pointed, comforting and appropriate. There were some fine practical hints in Rev. E. C. Baker's essay on, "How to attract the masses to the house of God." Rev. B. N. Hughes preached an able sermon from John 1:16; subject, "The fulness of Christ communicated to believers." Rev. W. Camp's essay on, "When is a person saved," will speak for itself through the Messenger and Visitor. The usual reports on Home and Foreign Missions, Temperance, &c., were read, discussed and adopted. \$17.12 were realized for Convention purposes. The next meeting will be held with the First Elgin church, the second Tuesday in October.

Concerning the Convention which

meets at Moncton in August, we wish to

say:

1. We desire the churches at the June

conference, or at the latest, at the July

conference, to appoint their delegates to

Convention and forward a list of same to

the undersigned.

2. Then we will forward place of abode

for such delegates during Convention.

3. No church is entitled to send more

than five delegates.

4. That while we would like to provide

free entertainment for "wife and mother-

in-law," as at last Convention here, we

find it impossible so to do.

5. But we shall, as far as possible, pro-

vide for all accredited delegates whose

names are forwarded before the 5th of

August.

6. Where delegates desire outside en-

tertainment, or where we are unable to

provide free accommodation, we will fur-

nish information concerning hotels,

boarding house terms, etc., on demand.

7. We can make no provisions for

teams.

8. Delegates connected with W. M. A.
