THE MARIANE PROVINCES

J. B. M. Baxter Introduces Resolution Looking to Greater Uniformity in Commercial Statutes - Durant Bill Considered by Committee - Excellent Progress Made and Chances Seem Good for Early Completion of Business of House.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, April 16.—If the House hereafter gets through the same amount of business that was transacted today, prorogation will take place in the windy weather that has been going on since the 19th of March is now at an end and members are inclined to have a reasonable view of the situation and expedite the business of the session.

Mr. Cripps' closing speech on the budget debate at an early hour this morning was extremely brief, for Mr. Cripps, who was much more reasonable in his statements than he usually is. There was no attempt at fairness in his utterances, but this is not expected either from the leader or any member of the opposition. Mr. Cripps' position in their stock in trade, together with a strongly expressed desire to escape responsibility for the acts of the old government.

Mr. LaBilios' efforts in this direction are almost amusing. He remained silent under the denunciations of the Commissioner Morrissey and in a somewhat lengthy reply he made during the early hours of the morning Premier Fleming's remarks made but slight reference to his management of the public works department. The position of the former government close of the debate is worse than at the beginning. They have not been able to disprove any of the damning charges which have been made by the management of the affairs of the province in every department by the former government and were now compelled to accept responsibility for.

The charges made against the government of extravagance during the whole debate were of the most general character. No specific charge of mismanagement has been brought to the front and proven by any opponent speaker. Scathing criticisms of which so much had been said in the papers by the former government are general statements without a title of evidence to support them. The position of the government was fully justified by every member who spoke. Not a single question raised by the opposition during the debate was left unanswered by a member of the supporters of the government.
