Open Letter to the Small Fruit Growers

Dominion Fruit Inspector writes on Value of Proper Packing—Helping to Make Name for Province.

St. John, July 4, 1912, To the Editor of The Standard.

Sir,—No province in our Dominion is better adapted for small fruit growing than New Brunswick. Our bright sunshine and other climatic conditions not only put a sprightly flavor in our fruits, but under a system of good cultivation grows them sufficiently large and attractive to make them sought after in any market on which they may be placed. The area on which they may be grown in the province is very wide and ample. Our provincial markets take a very large proportion of the small fruits grown and when this demand is met we have open markets in Montreal, Toronto, and Halifax for our surplus product; we have also the markets of the New England States that we might avail ourselves of later in the season and when their berries are out of their markets.

My purpose in this letter is to deal entirely with the market end of the business, hoping that the information it may contain will help all who are interested.

First, as to size of packages or boxes. The "Fruit Marks Act," and "Fruit Packages," as amended in 1907-8 and revised in 1910, requires that the standard berry box shall hold 4 1/2 of an imperial quart, which is practically the wine quart. It also provides that a smaller box may be used, but if used shall have the word short stamped on the side in letters not less than one-half inch square. Unfortunately I think some of our small fruit growers are marketing their berries in those small boxes, not marked, and thus making themselves liable to a fine of law to a penalty of 25 cents for each box placed on the market. Aside from the penalty imposed they are doing very much to depreciate the price, thus demoralizing the market and making everyone feel unpleasant who handles their berries. I notice that them for home consumption, while on the other hand those growers who use the full quart box, who pack their box full and make it look attractive are punished in the shrinkage in prices occasioned by the use and sale of the small box.

Second, as to straight, honest packing. It is a great delight to open a crate of berries and find a standard size or full quart box nicely packed full to the top and made attractive. You find the growers name and place of residence in full upon the crate and possibly on every box, where it ought to be.

These people are helping greatly to make a good name for New Brunswick grown fruit, to elevate it to the higher plane, where it properly belongs, on account of its quality and I notice that their berries are the first to find a purchaser. The fact is, our citizens want quality, and straight packing, regardless of price, and those who do not meet the requirements and demands of the market, must not complain if their business, duration of employment with each, salary required, and references as to character.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 21 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency for the district, city or town, may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader.

Within six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years from date of homestead on a farm of at least 5 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, or intending homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$20.00 per acre.

Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. (Dotted line report.)

Each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$2000.
