Open Letter to the Small Fruit Growers

Dominion Fruit Inspector writes on Value of Proper Packing—Helping to Make Name for Province.

St. John, July 4, 1912, To the Editor of The Standard.

Sir,—No province in our Dominion is better adapted for small fruit growing than New Brunswick. Our bright sunshine and other natural conditions not only put a sprightly flavor in our fruits, but under a system of good cultivation grows them sufficiently large and attractive to make them sought after in any market on which they may be placed. The area on which they may be grown in the province is very wide and ample. Our provincial markets take a very large proportion of the small fruits grown and when this demand is met we have open markets in Montreal, Toronto, and Halifax for our surplus product; we have also the markets of the New England States that we might avail ourselves of later in the season and when their berries are out of their markets.

My purpose in this letter is to deal entirely with the market end of the business, hoping that the information it may contain will help all who are interested.

First, as to size of packages or boxes. The "Fruit Marks Act," and "Fruit Packages," as amended in 1907 and revised in 1910, requires that the standard berry box shall hold 4 1/2 of an imperial quart, which is practically the wine quart. It also provides that a smaller box may be used if it is used, shall have the word short stamped on the side in letters not less than one-half inch square. Unfortunately I think some of our small fruit growers are marketing their berries in these small boxes, not marked, and thus making themselves liable to a fine under the law to a penalty of 25 cents for each box placed on the market. Aside from the penalty imposed they are doing very much to depreciate the price, thus demoralizing the market and making everyone feel unpleasant who handles their berries or purchases them for home consumption, while on the other hand those growers who use the full quart box, who pack their box full and make it look attractive are punished in the shrinkage in prices occasioned by the use and sale of the small box.

Second, as to straight, honest packing. It is a great delight to open a crate of berries and find a quantity of full quart boxes nicely packed to the top and made attractive. You find the growers name and place of residence in full upon the crate and possibly on every box, where it ought to be.

These people are helping greatly to make a good name for New Brunswick grown fruit, to elevate it to the higher plane, where it properly belongs, on account of its quality and the quality of their berries are the first to find a purchaser. The fact is, our citizens want quality, and straight packing, respect, less of price, and those who do not meet the requirements and demands of the market, must not complain if present business, duration of employment with each, salary required, and references as to character. DOMINION DAY AT TOWN OF ALBERT

Opening of New Public Park Marked by Successful Sports and Dedication Proceedings—Pastor Makes Change.

Albert, July 2.—The Dominion Day celebration here was a great success. A new public park was opened and duly dedicated.

The grounds were tastefully decorated with bunting and evergreens. Refreshment booths, fruit and confectionery stands and a dancing pavilion were well patronized.

A special train from Hillsboro arrived at 9 a. m., well crowded, bringing the Hillsboro brass band, which enlivened the proceedings with good music.
