AUTO OVER EMBANKMENT, FOUR HURT

Car hurled over bank into streamcarrying occupants with it — Two badly injured.

Special to The Standard. Hartland, N. B., Sept. 23.—Another serious auto accident today nearly cost the lives of four persons. About two o'clock A. R. Foster, with his wife, Mrs. Geo. Colwell and her daughter Della, of Middle Simons, driving in Mr. Foster's car, about a half-mile above Bristol, were dumped over an embankment at the entrance to the bridge crossing the Chateaubault stream and it was nothing short of a miracle that all four were not killed. The car after turning completely over landed on its wheels in the stream with Mr. Foster jammed about the steering wheel. Mrs. Foster, although badly hurt, had presence of mind to shut off the power and help extricate her husband. Help soon arrived and the injured were taken care of in houses nearby.

It was found that Mrs. Colwell was not seriously hurt, but her daughter was considerably injured and layed into unconsciousness. Mr. and Mrs. Foster remained conscious but were badly injured. Willing hands carried them on cots to the down express later and on its arrival here they were taken to the home of Mrs. Reed Chase, a sister of Mrs. Foster. Dr. Curtis, who went up after them from Woodstock and Dr. Rankine from Woodstock were also summoned. Examination by the doctors showed that Mr. Foster had received a bad cut across the back which had penetrated to the kidneys and had received other minor injuries. Mrs. Foster was badly cut and bruised about the head and face, but besides a bad shaking up was not seriously hurt. Mrs. Colwell and her daughter were able to go to their home after the arrival of the train.


BELLISLE STATION
