

## MORE DETAILS OF CANADA CAR CO. SHELL CONTRACT

Total contract from Russian Gov't \$83,000,000  
— Part sub-let to American firms.

Ottawa, April 22.—Further details have become available of the contract awarded by the government of Russia to the Canada Car and Foundry Company. The total is eighty-three million dollars. Five million shrapnel and howitzer shells are to be manufactured at an average cost of \$17.35. Out of the total contract sub-contracts to the amount of \$21,724,000 have been sublet to thirty-seven American firms for various amounts and further contracts are pending.

A large part of the work, however, is to be done in Canada by the Canada Car and Foundry Company, while other Canadian firms not already filled up with British orders are likely to participate in the execution of the huge order, the final negotiations for which were conducted by Senator Nathaniel Curry.

The Canada Car and Foundry Company in taking over the contract from the Russian government is understood to have assumed an option on all future orders for war materials on the American continent.

**Advances for Plant Extension.**  
The Russian government is to make advances to the Canadian company in cash, from time to time, of sums ranging from \$750,000 to \$4,000,000 and in a few instances may receive as much as ten millions, which funds are to be used for the extension of the company's plants.  
If the war should terminate the contract may be abrogated and cash advances used for plant extensions must be returned. The placing of orders for such large amounts promise to furnish a decided impetus to the steel industry in Canada.

## PORT OF CANADA DOCK CO. BILL AGREED TO BY CORPORATIONS COM.

Fredericton, April 22.—The Corporations Committee met this morning and agreed to the bill to allow the Cedar Hill Cemetery Company to extend the boundaries of its property. Provision was made that there can be no extension beyond water and sewerage limits until such services are extended. Another provision makes it necessary for the company to maintain a fifty feet wide space along Charlotte street side of the cemetery in which there shall be no burials.  
The bill to incorporate Port Canada Dock Co. was agreed to with amendments which provide among other things that work may be started within three years and completed within two years thereafter, while any branch lines of proposed railway must not interfere with any other port development work at adjoining harbors. The committee also agreed to the amendments proposed by the sub-committee to the bill respecting the South West Driving Company.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

**COAL.**—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. Unsurveyed territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or sub-Agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

**QUARTZ.**—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of quartz veins, may locate a claim 1,280 feet by 1,280 feet. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent. after the output exceeds \$10,000.

**DREDGING.**—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be leased to one applicant for a term of 30 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. **SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.**

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of the land, or may have a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$30 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres; extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$100.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
