Their Awful Plight on the Wrecked Brigantine Ora on Digby Coast During Sunday's Terrible Storm--- Hand Over Hand Along a Cable to Shore and Safety.

They were in the brigantine Ora, laden with lumber, from Annapolis and bound for the West Indies. They state that about 7. p. m., the Ora stanted to drag her anchors and ran so far that the crew could not slip the chains. Helpless to avert the impending danger they watched her drift towards the sharp tooth-like rocks of the Digby coast. At last, with a bound, she struck, about two miles above the Digby Gut light, and there she stayed pounding. In half an hour she was full of water and her side was stove in.
