## COMMISSION HAVE NO RIGHTS OVER PUBLIC STREETS

Must Gain Consent of Ratepayers First Says Engineer Gaby.

## AGAIN SUPPORTED HYDRO BYLAW

Although the notice was short, the meeting last night was a fair sprinkling of ratepayers out to hear Engineer Gaby of the H.E.P.C. and Secretary Hannigan of the Hydro Electric Railway Association discuss the Bylaw in all its places and if there were any doubters in the audience at the commencement, their doubts were dispelled after hearing the clear explanation given by the above gentlemen. Mr. Hannigan in an address which lasted over an hour gave a clear and decisive explanation on the scheme from beginning to end. He touched on the financial end of it and explained that no actual money would have to be put up by the municipality simply guarantee the Bonds. These Bonds will be guaranteed by the Provincial Government and now sell at a high price and bear interest at a correspondingly low rate, because there will be actual revenue producing assets back of every dollar of bonds. Further he said the municipalities will be partners and the right-of-way can be secured at the actual value and without unnecessary delay. He gave a comprehensive review of how the estimate as to the probable revenue to be derived had been figured out and stated that the Engineers employed by the Commission were the best men that could be secured and where other lines had been built and these same engineers had made estimates in every case they had come out on the right side of the ledger. What had been successful in other cases was proof possible that they understood their business. One good point that was brought out by the speaker was the fact that with the line in operation from Hamilton to

Elmira the farmers children would be able to gain a higher education by attending the Colleges and high schools in the larger centres the running of the road enabling them to return home every night. Farmers living within 22 miles on each side of the railway would enjoy the same privileges as those living in the towns and cities with lighting and power at a minimum rate. He outlined the successful operation of the London and Port Stanley Railway and what was accomplished in that case can be accomplished here. Cheaper fares, faster and better service were outstanding features touched upon.

## Engineer Gaby Speaks.

Engineer Gaby of the Hydro Electric Power Commission gave a most excellent address, and cleared up a few points that seem to be objected to, especially in this locality. As regards the using of King street in Kitchener and Waterloo for the proposed line Mr. Gaby said this had not been considered. The Commission had absolutely no power to do anything of this kind. The municipalities had control of its streets to do as they deem best. The commission were only the trustees of the people. In answer to a question as to where the line would run, Mr. Gaby said that the Hydro Commission Power had the power to utilize Park Lands, Sewer farms or other lands in the municipality but he was very emphatic in regard to running rights over the public streets. ## MOST OF CANADIAN WHEAT SOLD.

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—About two-thirds of the exportable surplus of Canadian wheat crop has already been sold and exported through the Canada Wheat Board. The total is variously calculated from seventy-five to a hundred million bushels, the quantity in the hands of farmers not being known exactly. A fair proportion of the supply has been moving to the United States, since the embargo was lifted.
