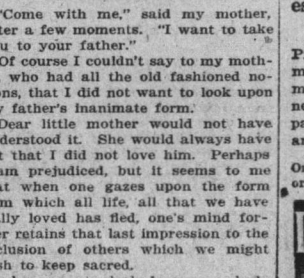


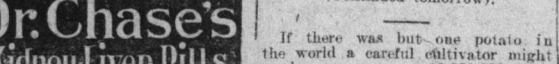
"I don't understand you at all," said mother.
