### PRESIDENT ANNOUNCES NEW **BUILDING CONSTRUCTION**

The provincial government has agreed to finance an addition to the engineering buildings at the University of New Brunswick, Dr. Colin B. Mackay, UNB president said last week.

In an address of welcome to upper classmen returning to the provincial university, Dr. Mackay said the additions would provide for an additional 21,000 square feet of floor space. This year, he pointed out, the engineering faculty will have nearly one-half of the

"Plans are already well under way and construction of the new addition will begin in May of next year," he said.

In a review of developments on the campus, Dr. Mackay explained that construction of the new chemistry building had been delayed, but it had not been abandined. Lord Beaverbrook, Honourary Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, has returned to the province for a lengthy stay. His Lordship, New Brunswick born British publisher and politician, a longtime benefactor of the University will be residing at the President's home on Waterloo Row. Arriving in Fredericton on Thursday last he attended his first University function as the guest of honour at the Freshman banquet on Friday evening, September 30. After speaking briefly to the assembled Freshmen he was presented with a freshman beanie and made an "Honourary Freshman".

The rink, situated on University Avenue, has been donated by His Lordship to the University and the school children of the city of Fredericton for joint use, and is one of the finest and most complete in the country.
