# **IS VERY SCARCE**

Serious Situation which Confronts Many Yeomen in Kent County

aled Hay Shipped in and Purchased Necessitated.

The question of securing feed for stock is becoming a serious problem

stock is becoming a serious problem with the farmers of Kent County.

It would be surprising if it were known how many farmers there are in Kent County who have not sufficient feed for their horses, cattle and hogs, with no way of securing it. There are very few farmers in the whole county who have feed for sale and of these there are none who have to come into the city to sell it—they can find enough purchasers among their own neighbors.

Matters are rapidly assuming a

their own neighbors.

Matters are rapidly assuming a serious aspect. Farmers who are unable to purchase feed are forced to sell their stock and others have bereight sufficient feed to carry them over the remainder of the winter. It is not an uncommon thing to see farmers coming in to the market, purchasing hay and taking if home. Bailed hay is also being shipped into the city from the east, and is greedily purchased by the farmers—those who are fortunate enough in having money to purchase it. Hay is also being shipped into Blenheim, something that has never been known before.

The Planet procured the following information from some of the farm-

James Coulter, of the 6th concession, Chatham Township, said:—
"Feed is very scarce. The most of the farmers around me have enough for themselves but positively none to sell. Feed has been scarce now for the past two years." past two years."

H. Burke, of the Lake Shore,

"There are few farmers who have enough feed for their own stock and all of them are buying hay, which is being shipped into Blenheim. There

being shipped into Blenheim. There is no wheat straw at all and very little oat straw in the country."

H. Nichols, of the 7th concession, Chatham Township, said:—

"Many of the farmers are forced to feed straw to their horses. Hay is surprisingly scarce and there is none in the country to sell. I heard of one farmer who had hay to sell. There is hardly any corn in the country, and what there is is not half ripe."

James Foster, gardener, has been all through the county. He said:—
"There are many farmers who have had to sell their stock because they had no feed."
Joseph Reaume, gardener, who has also travelled sall over the county, said:—

"There is practically no feed in the country. Fodder is also very scarce. I bought five acres of fodder the other day at a big price and the next day I had four farmers after me wanting to purchase it. They were willing to pay almost any price, but I needed it myself. Money is also very scarce in the country and those who cannot buy for lack of funds have to sell out. Bailed Hay is being shipped into the city in very large quantities and the farmers are ready bayers. It is a very common thing to see farmers going home at night with a sleighload of bailed hay—something which has seldom happepned before in the history of Kent County."
