UPPER CANADA.

Anything that affords gratification to the Toronto Examiner cannot be very pleasing to the loyal and well disposed of Her Majesty's subjects. We make this remark in consequence of finding the following in that paper of the 23rd instant:—

We have been much gratified to learn that Stewart Denbshire, Esq., an English gentleman of great talent, and of liberal and constitutional views, who was an attaché to the Earl of Derby's commission, is likely to take office under Mr. Thompson. This augurs well. Mr. Thompson cannot have better advisers than those gentlemen, who were employed with so much advantage to the country by Lord Durham.

Kingston, October 22nd.—Notwithstanding the disorders of the Province, a very good business has been done this season. The imports from the States have doubled at this Port. Last year, for the two quarters from April to Octbr., the duties on imports from the States were £600, and £700; this year the corresponding quarters are £1,400, and £1,200. The embarrasment of the money market in the States has caused several of their merchants to send goods for sale to Kingston at first cost, the seller of course paying duties, commission and freight. Tobacco, for instance, has been sent from Oswego to be sold here at its cost there.—Agricultural produce too, brings good prices; but indeed it is a mere drug in the market. It is with difficulty that any sales can be effected, and when they are it is at only half the price of three years ago, and sometimes not even that. The Government are offering wild land for sale, but improved farms with good buildings can be bought as low as their wild land.—Herald.

We mentioned last week the contradiction which the Chronicle gave to our account of an artillery man having died by yellow fever. As we made our statement on the best authority, we shall publish the following details in confirmation. In this case then, on the 23d yellow fever appeared; on the 24th it became most intense; and on the 25th the man died.

The black vomit—a well-marked symptom of the disease,—appeared a few hours before death, and a quantity of the same matter was found in the stomach after death.

The progress of the disease was most rapid, and entirely different from the Lake fever. All the medical men present concurred in the opinion of the principal medical officer, who was well acquainted with the disease in all its varieties, and who pronounced it a well-marked case of yellow fever.

We understand that the case with all its particulars has been reported to Head Quarters in England.—U. C. Herald.

COMMERCIAL.

Flour.—The Baltimore American of Saturday says that flour in that market had advanced \$1 per barrel, during the week.

At Baltimore, Oct. 18th.—Howard street Flour—several thousand barrels have been sold for export at \$6.25. The wagon price is \$6. The receipts are light, and the stock in market very small. City Mills Flour, \$6.25, full. There is no stock of any description in millers' hands.

Extract of a letter of 9th August, from a very respectable House in Malaga:

"It has been singularly unfortunate that while every thing up to the 25th ultimo, promised fair for a luxuriant crop of all kinds of fruit, on that and three successive days we experienced a most intensely hot Terral Wind, accompanied by a scorching sun, which has completely destroyed full one-half the crop of grapes and raisins, burning and shrivelling them up to half their natural size; hence instead of great abundance as was expected, the stock of raisins will be very short, and what is still worse, they will, from the causes stated, be of inferior quality in general. Other fruits have suffered but little in comparison."—Phil. N. American.
