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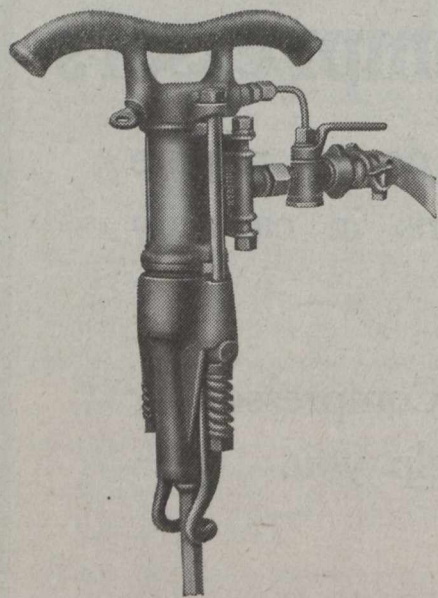
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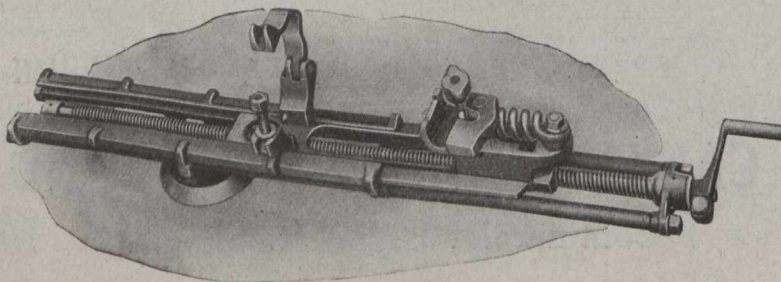
This double duty makes the "Cradle-Rotator" popular with small operators, and particularly with leasers.

## Drift with your Rotator

It's simple with the "Cradle." Tighten two hinge clamps over the drill, mount the shell in an arm saddle or on a bar, and you have a light, fast, one-man drifter, good for 8-ft. holes, and with 24-in. feed. A coil spring absorbs the shock of drilling.

The ROTATOR weighs 38 lbs., the "cradle," with shell and feed screw, 60 lbs. A 2½-in. single-screw column is just right. When done drifting, loosen the clamps, and you have a hand-drill for sinking, block-holing, etc.
