by Law, partly in the summer season,—that there are only thirtythree brench pilots, acting as such below Quebec; he knows that there are several persons resident in Lower-Canada, who have a sufficient knowledge of the River St. Lawrence, and of navigation generally, to act as pilots below Quebec, but who have not served the apprenticethip required by Law, and therefore cannot obtain licences if inclined to become such; that he thinks fifteen additional pilots would be sufficient for the river below Quebec; that the clause in the Act of the 45th, Geo. 3d. cap. 12, enacting, that persons acting as pilots, even in cases of necessity shall incur a penalty, has a pernicious effect; and that the regulation contained in the Act which preceded it, for the payment and removal of such persons, on meeting with a branch pilot ought to be revived --- That, if the pilots had boats, and remained always ready to embark when vessels bound up the River, arrive. it would be just and right that the first on board should be employed; but not otherwise-that the pilots have as much trouble in piloting a small vessel as a large one, to and from Montreal; and that the pilotage ought to be the same—that he does not think the pilots entitled to the same sum for bringing down a vessel as taking her up to Montreal; that the voyage from thence is performed in a shorter time, but the navigation is more difficult; that a pilot fent from Quebec, to bring a ship from Montreal, should be paid his travelling expences, and daily wages until he gets to the ship; that the same pilot who takes up a ship, if he brings her down, should have the full pilotage; if another pilot, he should have one half-that no pilot should be kept more than 48 hours at Montreal, without being paid, for further delay: that one of the pilots lives at Berthier, in the district of Montreal, the others at Quebec, and from thence to Dechambault; that pilots are victualled on board the ships and vessels in the way to and at Montreal. and during the fourteen days they are detained; that the wages paid to masters of river craft, having a similar knowledge of the navigation as the pilots is 15 or 16 dollars per month, and the navigation is open from 6 to 8 months;—that if he were obliged to fend to Father Point, for a pilot to take a ship from Quebec; he cannot say if daily wages ought to be allowed, to such pilot, from the time he lest Father Point, until he reached the ship; that he does not know that in any country the pilotage of large and small vessels is the same, that the Mon-
