Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled "An act for the Encouragement of Trade and Commerce; by providing a more easy method of securing the Duties payable by Law on Wines, Rum, and other Distilled Spirituous Liquors."

Ordered, that the said bill do pass.

On motion, the bill intituled "An act for the more easily recovering payment of sums subscribed towards the support of Clergymen and Schoolmasters; and towards erecting and repairing Churches, Chapels, Meeting Houses, and School Houses,"—received the second reading.

On motion, the House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the said Bill:

Mr. Fairbairn, from the committee appointed to manage the conference with his Majesty's Council, on the Bill intituled "An act for granting Licences to Tavern or Innkeepers and Store-keepers—and for regulating persons Licenced—and to suspend the operation of the Acts therein mentioned," reported the substance of the conference to the House.

Mr. Jardine, Chairman of the committee, reported, that they had gone into the consideration of the business to them referred, and that the Committee had come to certain Resolutions thereupon, which they had directed him to report to the House—and he read the same in his place, and afterwards deliver-

ed them in at the Clerk's Table, where they were read, and are as follows:

RESOLVED, 1st.—That it is the opinion of this Committee, that the first, second, third, fourth, seventh, eighth, and fifteenth of the said amendments be agreed to.

3d.—That it is the opinion of the Committee, that a conference be desired with the Council on the subject matter of the remaining amendments.

Ordered, that the Report of the Committee be agreed to.

Whereupon, Resolved, That a Conference be requested with the Council on the subject-matter of their amendments to the Bill intituled "An act for the Relief of His Majesty's Roman Catholic Subjects."

Ordered, that Mr. Cameron do go to the Council, and request the said conference.

Ordered, that Mr. Cameron, Mr. M'Neill, Mr. Brecken, Mr. Owen and Mr. Lewellin be a committee to manage the said conference.
