"LET BELLEVILLE FLOURISH"

The Board of Trade desiring to promote in every way the growth and prosperity of Belleville, may be permitted to offer a few suggestions regarding the profitable use of money which may be of interest to all who have the welfare of their own city at heart.

If we are to act as loyal citizens we must recognize the fact, that the interests of each and every person in the community are bound together, in other words, our interests are mutual. The community consists of all classes, mechanics, professional men, employers and employed, etc., and among all these there is a continuous interchange of service.

When we cannot readily be served with special work of materials, but which are especially in a city like Belleville, if any real advantage were to be gained by sending away there might be some excuse, but as a fact it is usually otherwise, not only for reasons above, but more than that the price as a rule for materials are as moderate in Belleville as in any place in Canada.

This familiar saying is applicable to the city, for without money in continuous circulation, the city is hobbled and hindered in its progress. "MINISTRY OF MUSIC"

Early Christian Church Was a Singing Church - Unifying Power of Song.

"The Ministry of Music" was the subject of a sermon last evening at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church by Rev. A. S. Kerr, M.A. The service was appropriately marked by the rendering of many choral works including the anthem "Hail to the Lord's Anointed," chorus and solo by Mr. S. R. Barrows, "How Long wilt Thou Forget Me," male chorus and solo by Mrs. Allen, "Judean Fair," quartette "One Sweetly Solemn Thought," Mrs. Allen, Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Stajworthy and Miss Strong; Solo "I will Extol Thee" - Mrs. Allen.

The note of praise and the psalm to be found everywhere in the Scriptures. The psalmist will testify to the harmony with his views there and he had better look to other literature. Jesus Christ was Himself a man of excellent praise. In every circumstance however commonplace, He finds a reason for praise. Thanksgiving is an essential part of worship.

Singing is not preliminary but essential to worship. In the non-conformist churches, the sermon is given on prominence, for the church is the poor man's university. But singing is necessary. It all depends upon our mood whether we find it helpful. If our spirit is right we will find singing just as important. Praise must be sincere, from the heart, not formal. Unless one has experienced goodness of God, one cannot sing with the heart. Singing should be to the glory of God not for one's own glory. The words of songs must sink into the soul.

The praise of God has always been a sign of health. Religion strong and healthy gives expression to itself in song. The early Christian church was a singing church. The movements of the Puritans, the Wesleys and Whitefield gave rise to songs and hymns. The great Evangelist Moody always took the singer Stanley with him.

"I do not believe that congregational singing is as good in our modern times as it used to be. But times change, I do not think the change is for the better. I sometimes long to hear the voices of the congregation above the choir. It would be a healthy innovation. If we find no joy, no gladness, no desire to sing, then something is wrong. One step to reach the song of the heart is to adopt formal singing and the spiritual may result. Hymns have cultivated friendships between nations. Nations exchange their songs and liturgies. In a book of praise there are Spanish, French, German, and English hymns. A Roman Catholic wrote "Lead Kindly Light" and a Unitarian "Nearer My God To Thee." The praise of God is no respecter of nations and religions. It knows no distinction of class, king and peasant having composed songs and hymns. This unifying spirit is needed today. There is one Savior, one standard of duty, one Heaven. The forces against the church stand shoulder to shoulder. God should be praised that by hymns He has succeeded in bringing unity.

SENSATIONAL WEEK IN THE LEGISLATURE

Parliament Buildings, Toronto, February 28, 1914. (Special to The Ontario)

An amazingly crowded five days has marked the second week of the Legislature. Any genuine excitement usually seems to be reserved until nearer the end of the session - for example, the Proudfoot changes of last year - but this time the color and the movement have begun early. It will be difficult for the rest of the year to keep up the pace.

The venturous sensation of course has overshadowed everything else and the chief fact in connection with it is that Mr. N. W. Rowell has put into practice what he has been preaching and when corruption appeared in his own party he dealt with it courageously and has driven the offending members from the Liberal ranks.

Apart entirely, however, from the big sensation, the week has seen debates on three subjects of first rank Provincial importance - Unemployment, Temperance and Tax Reform and has seen the Government vote down each of the three Opposition amendments. One called their attention to the creation of Unemployment and for the creation of a Department of Labor. The second expressed regret that the Government has taken no action to supplement their promise to introduce anti-trading legislation and that they have not proposed measures to abolish the Bar or otherwise effectively curb the evils of the liquor traffic.

The third proposed tax reform, petitioned for by all classes of people from all parts of the province and which the Government has now again turned down.
