**LAST REPORT BY LATE CHIEF CAMPBELL MADE PUBLIC AT COUNCIL LAST EVENING**  
Testimony of Harmony in Fire Department—His Thoughtfulness For His Men—Council Passed Resolution of Condolence

The last report of the fire department by the late Chief William H. Campbell was read in the city council last evening. This statement of the year was penned over two weeks ago, over one week before his death. Two weeks ago it was referred to the fire committee and last night the Mayor and Aldermen heard the last message ever to be sent to the council by the late lamented fire chief.  
The report shows in no mistaken terms the good fellowship existing between Chief Campbell and his men, the police department and the council and city officials.  
A chief, who knew the trials of firemen, he was ever mindful of the needs and comforts of his men. His last request was for rubber coats in the winter months for the Belleville firemen.  
"To His Worship the Mayor, Chairman and Members of the City Council—  
"Gentlemen—  
"In compliance with the rules governing the Fire Department I have the honor to herewith submit the annual report of the Department for the year ending the 31st of December, 1914.  
"During the year the brigade responded to 34 alarms, showing a loss of \$34,000 as near as can be ascertained, which is a fair showing.  
"It affords me great pleasure to be able to testify from year to year to the loyal support and able assistance which I receive from every officer in the department and to the satisfactory manner in which both officers and men perform their various duties.  
"It is also gratifying to me to witness the good feeling and co-operation that exists between the members of the police force and the fire department and how ready they are to assist each other when occasion requires.  
"I also return my sincere thanks to the members of the public press for

the many kind things said in relation to the work of the Department.  
"In conclusion I return my sincere thanks to the Mayor and members of the past council for the courteous treatment I have received as their hands and for the interest they have taken in the welfare of the department during the year.  
"Before closing I wish to call the attention of the council to the necessity of purchasing new rubber coats which are much needed in winter weather. Twenty-one will suffice at present.  
"Trusting you will give this matter your immediate attention."

**DATA OF FIRES**  
Appended to the late Chief Campbell's report was a statement of the 34 fires and alarms during 1914, causing an estimated total loss of \$34,000. The main fires were the Schuster block, 17,000; Walker Foundry, 3,000; Ontario House, 4,000; Balmoral block, 8,000.  
The smaller fires of the year caused such losses as 29,000, 75,000, 200,000; 350,000; 58,600; 5,000; 33,750; 400.  
Nineteen or twenty of the fires caused no damage. Of these seven or eight were grass blazes in summer. One was a blaze at the lower bridge, another a chimney blaze; another was in a rubbish heap; one was a false alarm and another an explosion in an evaporator.
