### Divorced Husband is Suspected by Mother

Woman Who Says She Lived in Moncton Asks Police to Help

BOSTON, Dec. 25.—The mystery is deeper tonight than ever in the baffling search being made for little Holger Oberg, the four-year-old son of Mrs. Carl G. Oberg, the wealthy Canadian who came here Sunday from Moncton, N. B., where she has been operating an osteopathy office. The little boy was stolen from the home of Mrs. Oberg, who had been granted the custody of the child, Mrs. Oberg, who is in New York assisted by a score of detectives in searching for her baby there, telegraphed the Grill family tonight that she had up to a late hour met with no success. She believes that a woman living in that city or near there is connected with the crime. Another woman is also mentioned by the Boston police as a close friend of the father of the missing child.

## Eventful Voyage of American Ship Atlas

### Collision Off Cape Horn With Loss of Life—A Mutiny

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 25.—The American ship Atlas dropped anchor here last night, 275 days out from Baltimore. It ended a voyage made tragic by a collision off Cape Horn, attended by the sinking of another vessel, the drowning of the fated craft's captain and the captain's wife, mutiny on its decks and death among its crew.

### GREENE-GAYNOR APPEAL IS DENIED

Federal Supreme Court Refuses to Review Case

Prisoners—Condemned to Four Years' Imprisonment and Fine Pleaded Limitation Statute

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—The Supreme Court of the United States yesterday denied the petition for writ of certiorari bringing to that court the cases of Benjamin D. Greene and John F. Gaynor, who are under sentence to pay a fine of \$5,549 and to undergo terms of imprisonment of four years each on the charges of embezzlement and conspiracy in connection with the harbor improvements at Savannah, Ga.

### WILL RUSH GUNS TO PACIFIC COAST

Government to Materially Strengthen Land Defenses

Rumor of British Squadron With Base at Esquimaux Suddenly Revives Discussion of Fortifications

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—There has been a sudden revival in administration circles of a discussion of the defenseless position of the Pacific coast, and a tremendous appropriation made at this session of congress. The argument in favor of such action is greatly aided by the reports that a British admiralty squadron with a fleet of 12 ships is expected to visit the coast of the United States.

## LEMIEUX NOT ANXIOUS TO TALK

### Will Report to Home Government First

### Is Optimistic, However, in Regard to His Visit to Japan

TOKYO, Dec. 25.—Rudolphe Lemieux, Canadian Minister of Labor, who concluded his negotiations with the Japanese government regarding the regulation of immigration to Canada, said to the Associated Press: "My lips are sealed on the subject. Any statement I have to make belongs first to the Dominion government. My mission will be completed only after my return to Ottawa. I have every reason to believe that a solution of the difficulty will soon be reached and I am pleased to say that my negotiations with the Japanese foreign office were conducted in the friendliest spirit." The Associated Press is in a position to state that the situation is identical with its previous forecast. Mr. Lemieux and Sir Claude M. MacDonald, the British ambassador, fully agreed with the terms of the memorandum, whereunder the Japanese government outlines its plans for the future control of immigration, the announcement of which will probably be made when a similar arrangement is outlined to Thomas J. O'Brien, the American ambassador, whom it is understood has submitted a number of suggestions from the American government for the consideration of the Japanese. The suggestion is a denial of the report that the arrangement submitted to Canada through Mr. Lemieux, and there is reason to believe that the Japanese government will soon submit to Ambassador O'Brien the details of the plans to control immigration to America, which practically amounts to the prevention of all labor immigration. The attitude of Mr. Lemieux toward the American proposals has caused much comment in the Japanese press, and it is understood that the American ambassador, who is in the city, has been invited to discuss the matter with Ambassador O'Brien. It is understood that the foreign minister, Viscount Hayashi, throughout the conference with Lemieux, consistently declined to sacrifice any treaty rights or to set any limit on the number of Japanese which will be permitted to enter Canada monthly. Minister Lemieux and party will sail for home on the Empress of China tomorrow, December 26.

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
