NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTION. With regard to his own province New Brunswick, Mr. Foster said that the late election had been run on different unes to any that had heretofore been run. New Bronswick had had a coalition government in the past, and for years there hau been theoretically no question of liberal and conservative in the provincial elections, but it had been simply a question of administration. Under Mr. Blair's premiership he began to throw the
