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

There is a fine bed of red clay there, with adjacent sand, natural water facilities, and the Goderich branch of the G.T.R. is only a



THIS STREET LOOKS PRETTY WELL LIGHTED



The above night photograph shows the illumination of Chapel street, New Haven, Conn. This street is illuminated entirely by magnetite arc lamps of the same type which it is proposed to install on the business streets of Brantford, and no other source of light was used in taking this photograph. The high type of illumination is brought out particularly well by the fine detail shown in the buildings in the foreground. The absolute uniformity of the illumination on the sidewalks and roadways should also be noted, and also the entire absence of shadows or dark spots. A feature which will appeal to business men ; the manner in which the fronts of the buildings are illuminated, the globes being so shaped as to project the light right to the tops.
