A statement issued yesterday says that the seat of the government was transferred to Kiev on Sunday and that agreements had been reached between the Bolsheviki government in Russia and the Rada regarding federal union with Russia and the complete unity of foreign and internal affairs. It is added that the representatives of all the army fronts have recognized the Bolsheviki Rada as the sole authority in the Ukraine. An all Ukrainian congress will be held

at Kiev in the next few days. Claims also are made by the Bolsheviki Government that all authority in the Crimea is in the hands of the Crimean council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates. Elsewhere the Bo-Isheviki claim to be winning, and they report the capture of Bobruisk, near Minsk. It is added that the Ukrainian soldiers
