Seattle Times Dishes up Hot Air Fake

Thrilling Story of an Electrically Controlled Roulette Wheel and What it Dld.

The following taken from the Seatle Times of recent date for yellowress is about on a par with the Examiner and other Hearst papers. No man ever lost \$40,000 here on a crooked wheel, and while it is true a San Francisco dropped about \$6000 in the Monte Carlo two years ago there never was any question but what the game was on the square. There is no saloon here called the Harry and the only Pazon ever known here was Harry Paron and he left years ago. The story shows the ear-marks of a vers crude reporter who was sadly in need

It is not at all unlikely that William H. Fazon and Mark Huff, two gamblers charged with conducting games in the Rainier-Grand hotel o this city will voluntarily return to the United States from Canada and stand trial for the offenses with

which they are charged. And the reason for their doing so is a good one. They are not only wanted by the authorities of King Washington, but from mos reliable sources it is fearned that the officers of Dawson, Y. T., will soon be after the men on charges similar to those made in this country.

As the story goes, Fazon and Huff swindled one man out of \$40,000 in two nights in a saloon at Dawson less than two years ago and just prior to the time the gamblers came to Seattle and began operating the alleged crooked games in this city. A week after the big trick was turned in Dawson Fazon and Hufi

The man whom the gamblers are said to have separated from a fortime was the manager of one of the largest firms doing business in Daw-The game was played, it is said, in the Harry saloon at Dawson The apparatus used was an electrically arranged roulette wheel, either the one alleged to have been used here or an exact counterpart.
