IT MADE THE STREET LIVELY.

TREASON ON ALL SIDES.

Members of the Reichsrath Openly Declare

They Want to See the Empire Fall—Some Favor Russia and Others Germany

Vienna, March 4.—The obstructionists again prevented the transaction of business in the Reichsrath on Saturday. The dialogue between Herr Silenz, Czech, and Herr Pan-German, was significant of the existing political and Parliamentary condition. Herr Silenz taunted the Germans with squinting toward Germany, whereupon Herr Stein shouted:—"We do not squint; we look. We wish to go over to Germany, as you do to Russia."

To this Herr Silenz replied:—"That is why the German Emperor recently said he hoped to establish a great northern kingdom on the Elbe."

Herr Stein retorted:—"The German Emperor is right: I declare openly that we wish to join the German Empire."

Herr Silenz—"Austria has not gained any advantage by her alliance with Germany, but she might profit much by a rapproche with Russia."

Herr Stein—"Say openly that you wish to belong to Russia."

Herr Silenz—"Anybody remaining a good patriot nowadays in Austria is a fool."

The Ministers listened silently, and the President did not check the speakers. Meanwhile 2,000 unemployed men made a demonstration outside the building, shouting "Down with Parliament," "Down with Czechs," "Down with the Pan-Germans," "The men inside are paid and do nothing. We are starving and want work."

The Prime Minister is negotiating with the various parties. He confers almost daily with the Emperor, who confides to the Cabinet that he does not wish to be sacrificed to the obstructionists.

The next part of the man's statement is the most astounding and apparently incredible. He seems not to have thought it worth while to call up the neighbors or inform the police, but lay down on the bed in the bedroom which adjoined the dining-room (and which bed was soaked in blood), and went to sleep. He slept until early in the morning, according to his account, and on awakening, looked again at his wife, who was stretched on the kitchen floor, as he alleges to have found her. The body was rigid; and as he seems to have then come to the conclusion that she was dead, he went to the residence of his father-in-law, Mr. Pratt, whom he informed of the occurrence. Mr. Pratt at once communicated with the coroner, and the police were notified.

An examination of the body showed that there were two wounds on the side of the neck, and also a wound on the breast. The clothes were in rags, and were bloodstained. The bed bore evidence of having been slept in, but otherwise its appearance was ghastly in the extreme. It was a large bed with two pillows. One of these showed the impress of a head, and was, together with a large portion of the sheet below it, soaked with blood, with several small pieces of flesh adhering.

There were six dogs in the house when the detectives arrived, and it seemed as though they had commenced to devour the corpse, as one of the legs showed the appearance of having been gnawed at. A basket covered with blood was found in the shed. Maynard's relatives do not believe that he had anything to do with the deed, but he is detained by the police to await the inquest, which will be opened to-morrow.
