## CELEBRINY PASSES AWAY

Deceased Was One Of Toronto's Most Honored Pioneers

CAPT. M' MASTER DEAD

Toronto, Jan. 8.—Capt. William Fenton McMaster died at 10.30 last night in his 65th year. He was one of Toronto's most honored pioneers, and the history of the city was almost entirely linked in association with his career.

entirely linked in association with his career.

A kindly and cheery figure about the Parliament Buildings, he pursued with assiduous industry until ten days ago his duties in the supervision of reports in the Department of Agriculture, and, though somewhat stooped, continued very active and walked to and fro with amazing vigor. On Dec. 28 he began to feel the weight of years, and having sank slowly since, passed quietly away last night at "Restholm."

Capt. McMaster was born on Sept. 1, 1822, near Omagh, Tyrone, Ireland,

Capt. McMaster was born on Sept. 1, 1822, near Omagh, Tyrone, Ireland, and landed in Toronto May 17, 1839. The place was then a country town, with two or three wooden wharves. He lay sick of ship fever for several weeks after his arrival in the room in Leader lane lighted by the fifth upstairs window from King street on the east side. Employed at first in Cathcart & Co.'s, where his uncle, subsequently Senator McMaster, afterwards became a partner, he went

Cathcart & Co.'s, where his uncle, subsequently Senator McMaster, afterwards became a partner, he went to Beamsville and was in business there with his father. At Beamsville also he married Jane, daughter of Dr. Summer. She survives him with their children, Robert S. F., secretary of the Toronto General Burying Grounds Trust; Charles A., in business in New York; Relen, married to A. L. Hertberg, assistant chief engineer of the C.P.R., and Miss Flora, who remained with her father. Seven grandchildren also survive him.

Capt. McMaster was in business also in Keen. Upon the death of his father he came to Toronto, when his uncle, his brothers and he established the firm of William McMaster & Nephews, the wholesale dry goods house. In 1865 Senator McMaster withdrew and the firm became A. R. McMaster & Brother, and so continued till 1885, when the captain gave up business and in the following year entered the civil service as assistant secretary to the bureau of industries, which expanded with the Department of Agriculture, where for ten years past he panded with the Department of Agri-culture, where for ten years past he has filled the position he held at his

death.

In addition to these duties he was one of the first directors of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce, and Toronto & Nipissing Railways. He was one of the founders of the Freehold Loan & Savings Co. When the Toronto Industrial Exhibition was founded he was elected first vice-president at the first meeting and held the office until 1893. He became an honorary director and held this position until the last.

Shortly after his arrival in Toronto he became attached to Brabant's Horse, and not only in military but in naval matters he proved himself capable and devoted. He was one of the very few men who passed with honors, both the military and naval examinations. In 1862 he founded the Toronto Naval Brigade for the defence of the lakes. He equipped the corps and maintained the men at his own cost, and in 1866, at the time of the Fenian Raid, the brigade was utilized in manning a gunboat, converted from a twin-screw tug. He supplied the equipment in this instance also, and the boat was despatched to patrol Lake Erie, where it remained till the arrival of troops and vessels of war. He retired from this service with the rank of major, and the brigade was broken up about 1863. Capt. McMaster was also an honorary officer in the Q. O. R.

Col. Cameron's Sudden Death.
Brantford, Jan. 8.—One of Brantford's prominent citizens, in the person of Col. Ed. Cameron, expired as he was entering his home about six o'clock last evening. He was in excellent health all day, but towards even. Shortly after his arrival in Toronto

He was formerly a lawyer, and was commanding officer of the 38th regi-

Rev. W. MacWilliam Dead.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The death occurred about midnight yesterday of Rev. William MacWilliam, who for many years had been librarian of Knox College. Deceased was in his 70th year. Deceased formerly preached at Streetsville, Ont., and then became a missionary at Prince Albert\*in the west. Later he had a charge at Port Hope. About 10 years ago he was appointed librarian at Knox College and also taught in the Bible Training School on College street. The late Mr. MacWilliams was a man of particularly ripe scholarship, though modest and retiring in his manner. A widow, a son and two daughters survive.
