It brings up the distinction between productive and unproductive labor. Workers are only useful to the world in so far as they produce or assist in producing things which feed or clothe or better the world in some way. If the New York lady hired men and women to dance before her all day the world would not be the richer, but the poorer for their dancing; because they produced nothing that helped to feed or clothe the world, while the world had to feed and clothe them. And the case of dressmakers who produce costumes which are worn a few times and thrown away is not very different from that of the dancers, Suppose the lady instead of spending \$200,000 per year on clothes had used it to construct a needed railway twenty miles long. More "work" would have been provided than in the first case, and at the end of the year, and for the future, the people of that district would have the benefit and use of a railway. In the one case the young woman takes goods which workmen somewhere produce and as good as burns them up, so that at the end of the year the world is that much poorer except for what the dressmakers may have saved, in the other case the goods have been consumed, it is true, but while they were being consumed a work was constructed which makes the world \$200,000 better off.

That fact was demonstrated to an absolute proof at the inquest. No unburned gas escaped into the room. They were asphyxiated by the carbonic acid gas produced by the burning gas, the chimney being completely choked and the room closed tight and without any ventilation. Carbonic acid gas is produced from all combustion of carbons, whether wood, coal, coal gas or natural gas, and it is again, I say, painful to have to corract Ald. Austin in an illustration so inapt and so manifestly misleading.

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I must say the same thing about Mr. Austin's statement that there was 15 per cent. sulphureted hydrogen inthis natural gas. That is another reckless and absolutely incorrect statement. The only analysis so far has shown 72 per cent., or less than 3-4 of I per cent.

Now, Mr. Editor, I must close. I realize that I have taken up agreat deal of your space, but the matter is one of great importance to the citizens of this city and my character is of great importance to me, and I will not have it assailed in print or on the street upon any such evidence as Ald.

The cost of warfare suggests that after all the check book may be mightier than the sword.

Butte hill, far famed as the richest mineral producing spot in the world, is an insignificant rise of land, not over 300 feet above the river level in the valley. It is approximately two and a half miles in length by two miles in width and is an ifregular oval in shape. The richest ore producing portion, however, is centered in a space of about two square miles. Within that limit there are no fewer than forty principal shafts from 1,000 to 2,400 feet in depth, besides many smaller and less important developments and prospects. Underground there is a network of drifts, cross cuts and galleries frequently intersecting there is a network of drifts, cross outs and galleries frequently intersecting each other and connecting the deep workings of different mines. It is estimated that there are more than 500 miles of such underground excavations. The output from this single hill is upward of 14,000 tons of ore a day, yielding more than 10,000 tons of refined copper a month, exclusive of gold and silver, which is fully a 50 per cent. larger production than any other cupriferous district in the world.

The Earth's Interior Iron?
Frequent earthquakes of late have enormously increased scientific curiosity about the earth's interior. On this subject Sir Oliver Lodge observes in Nature that "it has long been suspected that the earth is an iron planet, and now, through the work of Strutt and others, the evidence both for and against is intensifying. It is just worth noting as a matter of simple arithmetic that a core of metallic iron of density 7 covered with a crust of rock 500 miles thick of density 2.5 makes an average terrestrial density of 5.6, but recent evidence points to a crust much thinner than the above. It is to be hoped that the boring proposals of the Hon. Charles Parsans will before long attract the attention they dessive."—London Telegraph. The Earth's Interior Iron?
