

LAKE BAIKAL Vast Piece of Water Over Which Russi Has to Transport Her Troops for the Far East.

Lake Baikal, just now figuring so prominently in the war between Rus-sla and Japan, as the former power has to transport all her troops over has to transport all her troops over it, is a vast piece of water in Eastern Siberia. It is crescent shaped, and is surrounded by high and wild mountains rising to 3,000 and 4,000 feet above its waters. Its length from southwest to northeast is 370 miles, while its breadth varies from 20 to 70 miles. Its greatest depth is 4,500 feet, but the average depth of the southern part is about 800 feet. From the end of December to the



middle of May it is regularly frozen over, a railway being now in course of construction over the ice to carry the Russian troops. Lake Baikal forms part of the line of communication between Russia, the Amur and China, steamers plying between List-venichoye, at the outlet of the Lower venichoye, at the outlet of the Lower Angora, and Posolskoye in the delta of Selenga. To accommodate these boats and to act as a station point off which the trans-Siberian trains run on to the train-ferrying steamer used to carry troops, the big floating dock seen in our sketch was built. The dock is also used by fishermen engaged in the salmon fisheries, some 60,000 cwt. of salmon being caught and cured annually.

upon Lord Curzon during his holiday from the duties of the Viceroyalty of India, is an honorary post.

The greatest Lord Wardens were Pitt and Wellington. Pitt turned the castle Wellington. Pitt turned the castle into a dwelling house, where he was wont to entertain the admirals of the fleet lying in the Downs during the long war with France, and where the Marquis Wellesley (brother of the Duke of Wellington) visited him on his appointment as Governor-General of India, a hundred and seven years ago.

At Thrale's brewery house an apartment was assigned to Dr. Johnson, and he was a constant visitor there for some sixteen years. He assisted Thrale in his electioneering campaigns in Southwark. DR. THE HASTINGS COACH.

stly Legend Attached to the Rouse of the Earl of London.

Mr. T. P. O'Connor tells the fol-owing in his Mainly About People: lowing in his Mainly About People: To many prominent Scottish families there is, as is well known, attached some ghostly legend or other, generally taking the form of weird music or a similar manifestation, which is believed to forewarn death of some member of the house. Of such a nature is the famous "Hasting coach," which is said to be heard (although not seen) driving to the door, when the death is imminent of any member of the ancient family of which the Earl of Loudon and Lord Grey de Ruthyn are now the heads. Lady Victoria Kirwan, mother of the lady who has for some years past devoted herself the further the material and moral welfare of the working shop girls of welfare of the working shop girls of the West End, had good reason, she used to tell her intimate friends, for believing in the truth of this legend. Her brother was the fourth and last Marquis of Hastings, who died in 1868, in his twenty-seventh year, after a career on the turk alike brief after a career on the turf alike brief, brilliant and disastrous.

Lady Victoria's story was that she was dining in her brother's company (I think in his own house) in the autumn of 1868, soon after the Newmarket October meeting, when Lord Hastings was seen on a race course for the last time. In the middle of dinner she heard the grinding of carriage wheels on the gravel outside, and immediately afterwards a loud ring at the door bell. The servants apparently heard nothing but vants apparently heard nothing, but the young Marquis instantly rose from the table, and said he would go himself and see who had arrived. A few moments later he returned to the dining-room with a white face and a strange smile, and, looking around on the assembled company, offered to wager a large sum that there would be a funeral from the house within a month. Three weeks later he himself was lying dead in an upper chamber. The ghostly warning had come to no one in the room except his sister and himself—for it is heard only by those of the Hastings blood.

An English School Fete. There is probably no old English custom so rich in interesting memories as the pancake-tossing ceremony of which the hall of Westminster School was recently the scene. The custom, which is known to the boys by the unaesthetic name of "Grease," has an unbroken history which takes us back to the days of Ousen Bess. when as many as 300 which takes us back to the days of Queen Bess, when as many as 300 boys would scramble in one tumultuous heap for the possession of a solitary pancake. Heneage Finch, first Earl of Nottingham, groveled with the rest long years before he subsided into the no less coveted Woolsack. John Dryden, the parson's boy from Northamptonshire, struggled on the floor with young Christopher Wren; and from the crowd of pancake-snatchers in 1743 you might have picked out William Cowper, Warren Hastings and Charles Churchill, all very small boys, to whom the pancake loomed much larger than the laurels they later won. whom the pancake loomed much larger than the laurels they later won. And among the scrambling crowds of other years were John Locke, Charles Longley (destined to be Primate of all England). Edward Gibbon. Lord Raglan and many another boy who was to win much greater trophies in the big world outside the school walls.

Then think of the stories those walls could tell had they but tongues. Edward the Confessor watched the building of the arches on which the "school" rests; King John was signing Magna Charta when the very walls which re-echoed the boys' shouts this morning began to rise on the site of the dormitory in which generations of Benedictine monks had slumbered. Boys were learning their lessons in the same hall years before Oliver Cromwell was born, and for three centuries all the classes of Westminster School were held where the pancake was tossed to-day.—Westminster Gazette.
