ABOUT PUSH BALL.

Now This Very Interesting Game Is Played.

Push ball is played on a gridiron field or floor 120 yards long by fifty wide, with goal posts at either end and twenty feet apart and connected by a cross-bar seven feet from the ground. The mammoth ball, almost globular in shape, should measure six feet in diameter and weigh between forty-eight and fifty pounds. It is usually inflated with compressed air.
The ball is placed in the middle of the field, and the teams line up as follows: Five forwards on the forty yard line, two left and two right wings on the twenty yard line, and two goal keepers on the goal line, eleven men each. At the sound of the referee's whistle both sides plunge at full speed upon the ball, and then the fun begins: If the ball is caught fairly between the two human battering rams there is a rebound from its elastic sides that sends the players sprawling like tennishens.

It does not take long, however, for the entire twenty-two men to get around the sphere, put their shoulders to the wheel, so to speak, and push for every ounce of energy in them. The heavier, stronger team will, of course, have the advantage, but some trick plays have been invented which lend variety to the game and redeem it from being a featureless contest of mere brawn and muscle.

WHEN YOU ARE SICK.

An English Literary Prescription to Be Taken During Recovery.

For reading during convalescence the British Medical Journal prescribes literature that cheers but does not flatter, and warns persons recovering from illness against writers "whose style, like that of George Meredith, puts a constant strain on the understanding of the reader, or like that of Maurice Hewlett, irritates by its artificial glitter, or like that of Marie Corelli, annoys by its frothy impudence." Dickens should go well during convalescence, except "Pickwick," at least in surgical cases, because of the many side splitting episodes which would play havoc with the union of parts. For the same reason, in order that healing granulations may not be interfered with, Mark Twain's works are absolutely interdicted.

"Smiles" Self Help is quite innocuous," says the learned journal, "but we should be cautious in recommending it in order that the patient may not thereby be led to meditate over a misspent career and to have suggested to him all the opportunities in life he might have grasped, but did not. A despondency might thus be induced which would delay a restoration to health, and which might even prove fatal. Thackeray, except 'Vanity Fair,' which is a pessimistic book, should go very well. 'Pendennis' and 'Barry Lyndon' will certainly entertain."

SKULLS FOR CUPS.

Barbarous Custom of Fierce Tribes of Northern Europe.

The barbarous custom of converting the skulls of enemies into drinking cups was a common one in ancient times among the fierce tribes of northern Europe and was not unknown to the people of the more civilized regions farther south. The Italian poet, Marino, causes an assemblage of friends to quaff their wine from the skull of Minerva, and in his "Wonder of a Kingdom" Torment makes Dakker say: "Would I had ten thousand soldiers' heads, their skulls set all in silver, to drink from." To his confusion who first invented war.

Thomas Middleton, a dramatic writer of the early part of the seventeenth century, is believed to be the originator of the phrase, "A soldier's drinking cup," as applied to a human skull. In "The Witch," one of his most celebrated plays, the duke takes a bowl, which he is told is a human skull, whereupon he exclaims:

Call it a soldier's cup, I will pledge us, though the cup
Was once her father's head, which as a trophy
We'll keep till death.

One of the delights of the immortals, as represented in the old Scandinavian sagas, is that of drinking to drunkenness from the skulls of vanquished foes.

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WOMAN'S WORLD

MRS. HUGO ROSENBERG.

President of the National Council of Jewish Women.

Mrs. Hugo Rosenberg of Pittsburgh, president of the National Council of Jewish Women and one of the most active members of the organization, is probably one of the best known club women in western Pennsylvania. She founded the Columbian Council of Jewish Women in Pittsburgh in 1893 and has been its president repeatedly. Her active work along so many lines made it impossible for her to give her attention to the local council, and she resigned her position as president, being immediately made honorary president.

She is a member of the tenement house and the public baths committee, a director of the Pittsburgh and Allegheny Free Kindergarten association,

an officer of the Civic Federation of western Pennsylvania and national president of the committee of peace and arbitration. She is also vice president of the Civic Club of Western Pennsylvania. She has held the office of both president and secretary of the State Federation of the Y. W. C. A. She is chairman of the committee on forestry of the State Federation and one of the founders of the Columbian council school settlement. She personally organized sections of the Council of Jewish Women in Pittsburgh, Youngstown, Altoona, Philadelphia, Washington, Trenton and other cities.

Mrs. Rosenberg is a Pittsburgh woman, a graduate of the Pittsburgh High School.—Pittsburgh Dispatch.

Bureau Drawer Satchel.
To make a pretty and convenient satchel for the bureau drawer, take one-half yard of light blue (or pink or lavender, for that matter) silesia and double its width. The material is so wide that this will make a bag of about 24 by 18 inches. Turn the material over so the sewing of one of the shorter seams. Within this blue bag put two layers of cotton batting, between which is sprinkled the satchel powder.

Over all place a neat little slip made of plain white Swiss. Make a hem of about one inch and sew the slip together by means of blue featherstitching. If the latter is done in washable blue or marooned cotton the slip is strictly practical, for it can be washed time after time.

When you choose to renew your satchel merely rip one end of your silesia bag and pull out the cotton batting. Then slip in the new. One of the specially recommended features of this satchel bag, which, of course, may be made in any size, is its small cost. Moreover, the size mentioned here is well suited for placing in a suit case when one packs up for a short trip.

ting it dry this way. When dry shake off the fuller's earth and brush lightly the cloth. If properly done there will be no ring. Sometimes the fuller's earth used alone is quite sufficient to remove the spot.

The correspondent adds: "A handsome gray dress skirt belonging to the writer had on it a smear of black railroad grease which did not yield at all to ordinary cleaning. So kerosene was used, the wet spot being afterward covered with fuller's earth and left to dry, but there remained still some of the black stain. Again the kerosene was vigorously applied, followed by the fuller's earth, as before, and the result was all one could wish. It was impossible to see where the spot had been, and it never came back, as grease spots are prone to do."—New York Post.
