50 DEAD, 100 INJURED

Sappers Mutiny at Kieff, But Fail to Make It General.

Mowed Down by Infantry—Company Rebels Against Martinet Commander and Leads Attack Against Fortress—Court-Martial Orders Future Mutiny to Be Quelled by Artillery—St. Petersburg in a Panic.

London, Dec. 4.—The Daily Mail's Kieff correspondent in a despatch dated Dec. 2, and forwarded by way of Podwoloczyska, says:

Early yesterday morning a company of sappers, dissatisfied with their martinet commander, mutinied and persuaded a second company to join them. They left the fortress fully armed, and by threats compelled the remainder of the sappers' battalion to join them.

Numbering a thousand, the mutineers marched to the barracks of the 125th Kurak Infantry, which, however, remained loyal.

A body of Cossacks allowed the rebels to pass them in the street. Finally the mutineers arrived at the barracks of artillery division, and the Asov Infantry. The Asov men answered their appeal with insults, and the rebels opened fire upon them. The Asovs answered with three volleys. A portion of the mutineers fled, but the others continued firing. The Asovs replied with deadly volleys, and finally the rebels fled heading, throwing down their arms. Two hundred of them surrendered, and were conveyed to their barracks by Cossacks.

All was over by 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon. Fifty dead and 100 mutineers were left on the ground. A court-martial has been convened, and a notice issued that any further attempt at mutiny will be quelled by artillery.

Panic in St. Petersburg. St. Petersburg, Dec. 2.—(1 p. m.)—Via Berlin, Dec. 3.—Intense alarm prevails here. Communication with the outer world by telegraph ceased this morning when the Finnish joined their Russian comrades.

The embassies, legations and banks are hastily organizing courier services to both the Finnish and German frontiers.

The population is almost in a state of panic. This morning newsboys were openly hawking flysheets in the streets containing an account of the alleged revolt at Tsarskoe-Selo, and crying out, "The Emperor's Palace Guard has mutinied."

This situation has greatly increased the dangers of a financial crash.

Open Mutiny.

The situation in the Baltic provinces has grown exceedingly grave and the troops at Revel and neighborhood are in open mutiny. All attempts to secure details of the uprising have thus far failed.

Count Witte continues to refuse to deal with the telegraphers, declaring that for the Government to yield would be equivalent to an abdication at this order.

Confined to Reservists.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 2.—(4.30 p. m.)—Via Eydtkuhnen, East Prussia, Dec. 3.—At the War Department, this afternoon it was declared that the outbreak of troops in the Baltic provinces was confined to reservists, who were insisting on their immediate discharge. The officials refused to furnish details.

General Railway Strike.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 2.—Via Eydtkuhnen, East Prussia, Dec. 3.—It is expected that a railway strike will be declared either to-morrow or Monday. The latter is a holiday, which fact will enable the workmen to meet and decide on a common plan of action.

Alarmist News in Paris.

Paris, Dec. 3.—Undated despatches from St. Petersburg, arriving by way of Eydtkuhnen, East Prussia, give the following information.

There is the greatest excitement among the sailors and the authorities have ordered the disarmament of the warships. The officers, fearing a mutiny, acceded to the demand of the sailors for the release of a workman who was arrested while distributing revolutionary proclamations.

Soldiers and sailors are driving about the streets creating disturbances. The military authorities are preparing representative measures. Heavy forces of artillery are arriving at the capital, causing a panic among the population.

Officers had a meeting at Tsarskoe-Selo and refused to order their men to fire if called on to suppress disorder. Mutiny at Odessa.

Vienna, Dec. 3.—The Tagblatt publishes a communication from Odessa, Galicia, from which point it was telegraphed. It reads as follows: "The Ismailia and Donau regiments, stationed at Odessa, mutinied, but the authorities succeeded in disarming all the men."

It is reported from Odessa that a general strike will be declared Monday.

Advices from Sebastopol declare that the panic there is increasing. The members of the so-called social military party are holding meetings in all the parks, and this fact greatly increases the anxiety of the future.

Strike at Warsaw.

Warsaw, Dec. 3.—Seven hundred post and telegraph officials are on strike here. About a hundred officials refused to join in the strike. The strikers pour vitriol into the letter boxes. Two hundred bags of foreign mail are lying here unopened.

Slaughter at Kieff.

Kieff, Russia, Dec. 3.—Via Warsaw, Dec. 3.—There has been serious street fighting between mutinous sappers and Cossacks, and between workmen and bands of the "Black Hundred," scores of persons having been killed or wounded.

Martial law has been proclaimed.

CEAR FAVORS CONCESSIONS.

People Are on the Road to Liberty and Nothing Can Stop Them.

Paris, Dec. 4.—The correspondent of The Journal at St. Petersburg sends the text of a further revolutionary manifesto issued yesterday (Sunday). In reply to the expressed intention of the Government to return to repressive measures. The manifesto says: "The Government continues to defy a people on the road to liberty, where nothing can stop it. All police measures and the armed intervention of troops can only result in sanguinary conflicts for which the Government will be responsible."

The correspondent says he is informed by a high functionary that animated discussions are proceeding at the palace at Tsarskoe-Selo, the Emperor favoring the granting of concessions, and the re-establishment of the public service at any price, with Count Witte in opposition. The Premier refusing to grant the demands of the Government employees on the ground that they had no right to combine.

British Naval Estimates.

London, Dec. 4.—An official memorandum issued by the Admiralty states that as the result of recent reforms in the next estimates for the navy will show a reduction of \$7,500,000 beyond the reduction of \$17,500,000 made last spring. The Admiralty considers that the present strategic requirements will necessitate the building of four large armored ships annually.

Deserter Gives Up.

Brookville, Dec. 4.—Saturday night the police found a stranger wandering about the streets. He said his name was Henry Murphy and that he deserted from the 10th Battalion, Kingston, last May, going to the United States, where he resided until Saturday, when he struck Brookville with the intention of giving himself up.

DR. M'LEOD NOT GUILTY.

Canadian Accused as Accessory in "Suit Case" Murder Discharged. Boston, Dec. 4.—A verdict of not guilty was reported in the Superior Court Saturday in the case of Dr. Percy D. McLeod, charged with being an accessory after the fact to the illegal operation which resulted in the death of Susantha A. Geary, the victim of the suit case tragedy, and with concealing the crime. The prisoner was discharged.

The case was given to the jury at 4.45 p. m. Friday, and a conclusion was reached at 10.15. In accordance with the instructions of Judge Stevens the verdict was sealed, and was reported when court opened Saturday.

William B. Hunt and Louis W. Crawford, who pleaded guilty several days ago to the charge of being accessories after the fact to the illegal operation, were brought into court, and each was sentenced to not less than six years nor more than seven years in the state prison.

In imposing sentence upon Crawford and Hunt Judge Stevens expressed regret that the public statutes prevented him from making the penalty heavier.

MORE EDITORS IN TROUBLE.

Hamilton Newspaper Men Have Offended Courts and Plumbers. Hamilton, Dec. 4.—The preliminary examination of the fifteen master plumbers, charged with conspiracy, was resumed at the police court Saturday morning.

Manager Strath produced the association's account and check, showing how much each of the members had received of the \$2,700 in the treasury at the time it was decided to suspend operations on account of the Toronto prosecution. There was still \$400 to the credit of the association.

Secretary Davies was recalled and was questioned as to the arrangement for dividing up the percentage added to contracts, and the system of awarding contracts. The case was adjourned sine die. It will likely be resumed in a week.

It is said that the editors of the local papers may be brought up for contempt of court for commenting on the case.
