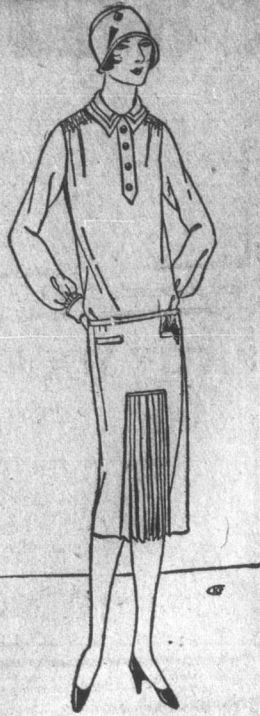
WEMBLEY IS CLOSED

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The British Empire Exhibition, which opened at Wembley in 1924 to benefit the trade of the British Empire, closed its doors today. The buildings will be immediately dismantled. In the two years it has been running, 27,000,000 persons have visited the exhibition. Despite its popularity, largely due to the constant patronage of the King, the members of the Royal family and the prominent personages, it has not proved a financial success. It is contended, however, that the ultimate results will be incalculable in money.

FIXED DATE FOR EASTER IS NOW IN SIGHT

TOTONTO, Nov. 5.—It remains only for the International conference to put into effect in 1928 the fixing of the second Sunday in April as Easter Sunday every year, according to Moses B. Cotsworth, the Apostle of Calendar Reform and Director of the "International Fixed Calendar", who was in Toronto today in conference with Board of Trade officials relative to the furthering of the 13 month year idea, with its four-weeks-in-a-month, and "year day" and "leap day" as features.

AUSTRALIA WILL ADOPT COMPULSORY VOTING

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Compulsory voting will be introduced for the first time at the Australian general elections November 15, the Commissioner for Australia, Sir James Elder, was advised yesterday. For the last ten years compulsory voting has been enforced in the state of Queensland, but this is the first time for it to be applied to federal politics. Under the new law, registrars prepare lists of those entitled to vote and any elector who fails to go to the polls, without giving a valid reason for staying away, will be liable to a fine of ten dollars.

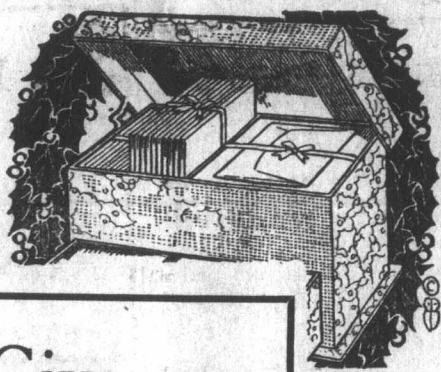
