The Calgary Excursion

We were very much pleased with the correspondence published in our last issue concerning the contemplated excursion from Calgary. The people of Cardston would certainly be pleased to have those of our own Province become better acquainted with the country here and our people, and of course we are all proud of the beautiful Temple that is the great object of such a proposed trip.

The idea seems to have gone out that the Temple may be closed to visitors at an early date. This is a mistake and it will not be known definitely as to the time of dedication and its consequent closing to the public for some months. If the Temple can be completed, as to decorations and furnishings this season, which is as yet an open question, it would not be possible to have the dedicatory services before August or September. More may be known definitely in this matter during the coming week.

Meantime let us welcome the visitors from Calgary most cordially, and we trust that the Board of Trade will get busy and make definite arrangements at an early date for their coming.

The Globe would suggest a date when seeding is pretty well finished, say about May 24th, or immediately after so that it would enable the business men of Calgary to take advantage of part of the holiday time for the trip.

We are sure the "Community Spirit" that has been so heartily shown by our citizens in the recent past, will again be manifest in the entertainment of our visitors from the City of Calgary. There is not too much time for working out the details even though the date be set as above suggested, so we again urge prompt action by the Board of Trade or failing them by the Mayor and Council.

In order to begin the spring seeding, Mr. Wm. O. Bigelow left for his farm north of Raymond some four miles, where he is putting in a section of land in wheat. He will be assisted by Messrs. Frank and S. Aldridge, who are shipping down their engine and machinery to commence work at once.

Some of the Cardston ladies made a well planned descent on Mrs. E. N. Weeks recently and spent a very pleasant afternoon. It was what the ladies call a "shower" given on behalf of the "Twins." The day being fine all enjoyed the walk over to the farm as well as the refreshments and the very cordial feeling manifest by all present. Pleased The Third Audience

L.D.S. Cantata Was Certainly a Rare Musical Treat

Wednesday night, for the third time, the L. D. S. choir rendered the cantata "Saul, King of Israel" to a delighted audience which packed the auditorium of the church. The oft heard expression that it was the best musical production ever put on by local talent was not in the least overdrawn and was fully merited.

As mention has already been made of those in charge of the special features of the production we will pass that over, but too much cannot be said of the singing of the chorus, and some of the more important parts. From start to finish the chorus was simply superb and the perfect harmony and blending of voices elicited exclamations of delight and hearty applause. As Saul, Mr. L. W. Swain maintained the character splendidly and his excellent bass voice was in fine trim. As David and Jonathan, Bishop Gwilliam, and Dr. Brown, both splendid tenors, carried their parts well and were much appreciated. John W. Wilson as Samuel the prophet, was simply masterful. His is one of the best baritone voices ever heard in Weiser and he was magnificent in his part. Mrs. Owen S. Brown captivated all with her rendition of the part of Saul's daughter, while Mrs. C. J. Brown, as usual, with her rich, clear soprano, was a leading star of the attraction.

The costumes were very elaborate and beautiful and the stage settings, the skilful work of Miss Irene Thompson, were very pretty and artistic. Certainly Messrs. J. F. Layne, musical director, and J. H. Anderson, director of the historical features, deserve great credit for the success of the production. It indeed marks an epoch in the history of musical productions in Weiser and speaks volumes for the wonderful musical talent of the Latter Day Saints church of our city.

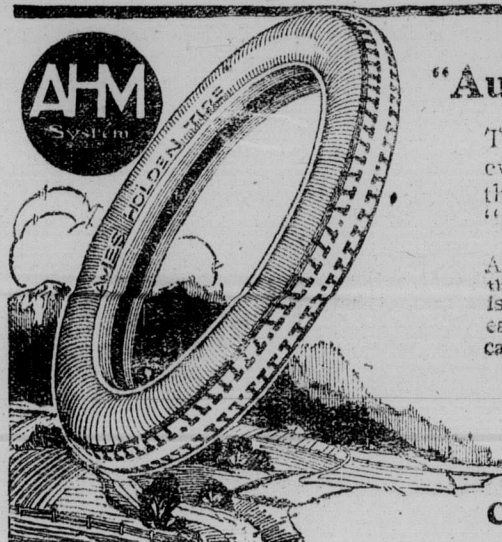
