The principle on which hese subsidies were established at lonfederation was right enough, if the lovernment at Ottawa had made then a finality, but the wholesome rule was broken through in 1868, only one year after Confederation, when Nova Scotia, which had almost gone in rebellion against the Union, obtained better terms in order to pacify her people. The pernicious system was followed in the case of other Provinces, and one after another, with the excep-tion of Ontario, have obtained concessions from the Government at Obtawa. In the case of Ontario the handsome surplus with which we started as a separate Province—thanks to the wise nd economical management of the and economical interest and economical Mowat Government—has been retained almost intact. But it has been very different with the other Provinces, especially with Quebes. Mainly through the extravagant and reckless policy of the Tory Governments which were in power there for years, a heavy debt was incurred. At the present this Province has a funded debt of \$21,510,960, and a total debt of \$27, 157,808, against assets of \$14,843,847; and the annual charge for interest upon the debt is \$1,184,789. Including this interest charge, the expenditure of Quebec in the fiscal year 1888-9 was \$5,124,186, while the expenditure of the larger Province of Ontario-whose population exceeds that of Quebec in ratio of about four to three-was only \$3.653.856. Mr. Mercier partly accounts for this heavy debt by the expenditure on the construction of railways. But the same may be said of Ontario, for since 1872 this Province has expended on railways no less a sum than \$5,154,-616, a sum considerably larger than that spent by Quebec. Our other expenditure, too, for asylums, public instruction, literary and scientific in-stituions, charitable institutions, and for other public objects, have been larger than those of Quebec, and yet, as we have said, we have still our surplus Mr. Mercier's proposal will not meet

with the approval of the people of Ontario. Were it carried out the Dominion debt, heavy enough already, would be increased, which would lead in all probability to an increase of our taxation. Quebec started its separate existence on as good a footing as Ontario. Why should this Province now have to pay a share of an increased subsidy to that Province because her Governments have been reckless, extravagant and corrupt? To comply with his demand now, and to make a new division of Provincial subsidies, would simply be aggravating the evil. It would encourage improvident Governments to go on increasing their ex-penditure, knowing that they could nome again on the Dominion Government with fresh demands for more money. It is far better now to resist these. If Quebec is so heavily in debt, her rulers must begin to practice economy, out down her expenditure to the last dollar, and manage her affairs in the same economical manner as has marked the rule of the Mowat Government in Ontario.

Doctors seem to have a liking for politics, and there is generally a fair proportion of them in the Dominion Parliament and in the Local Legislatures. The new Ontario Legislature will have its own share of them, for the following have been elected: -Dr. Baxter, of Haldimand; Dr. McKay, of South Oxford; Dr. Dowling, of South Renfrew; Dr. McKay, of West Victoria; Dr. McMahon, of North Wentworth; Dr. Gilmour, of West York; Dr. Barr of Dufferin; Dr. Preston, of Leeds; Dr. Willoughby, of East Northumberland; Dr. Wylie, of West Simcoe; Dr. Meacham, of Lennox. Of these the first six are Reformers, while the remaining five are Conservatives. Among the defeated candidates there were four doctors, as follows: Dr Tennant, of South Bruce; Dr. Hunt, of Centre Grey; Dr. Fleming, of West Kent, and Dr. R. F. Preston, of North
