## COVEY WILL PROBE SKATERS' STANDING

Officers of Maritime Skating Association Resigned Yesterday at St. John Meeting

St. John, N. B., Feb. 27.—The Maritime Province Amateur Skating Association is without officers to-day as a result of wholesale resignations handed in yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the association which was held in the Board of Trade building, Prince William street.

An effort is to be made by A. W. Covey, president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C., to have a thorough investigation held into the international skating meet, which was held here recently, and into the jubilee meet in Moncton. The barnstorming trip of amateur skaters throughout the Maritime Provinces was also discussed. Reports of alleged violations of amateur standards were discussed and a lively session developed.

The meeting opened quietly enough with Frank White, the president, in the chair. The others present were: P. J. Legge, the secretary; A. W. Covey, of the Rotary Club; H. J. Sheehan, of the Y. M. C. I.; Charles Burpee, of the G. Y. Club, and Elmer Ingham, of the St. John Rowing Club.

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## Expect Fast Ice Surface For U.N.B.-King's Game

Weather Milder To-day But Hard Ice Promised At Amherst

## U. N. B. NEEDS FAST SURFACE

Red and Black Players All Reported to be in Good Shape.

Amherst, N. S., this morning indicated that prospects were good for hard, fast ice for tonight's play-off game between the University of New Brunswick and King's College hockey teams to decide possession of the Summer Trophy.

While the weather was milder than it has been for some time, the rink management at Amherst expected to have a fast sheet of ice for the teams. U. N. B. had had a workout at the rink in Amherst and the squad were all said to be in good shape this morning.

U. N. B.'s long suit is speed and if the ice surface is not hard and fast the Red and Black will be considerably handicapped. Jack Twaddle, the Amherst veteran, has accepted the position of referee of the game.

London, Feb. 27.—In the 20-round bout at the National Sporting Club last night for the bantamweight championship of Great Britain, Bugler Lake beat Tommy Harrison, the title holder, on points. Lake was altogether too quick for his older opponent and easily secured the verdict.

## Summer Trophy's History

The Summer Trophy was first played for in 1909, when it was won by University of New Brunswick.

Since then, according to available records, King's College and Acadia have each won it once and Mount Allison University held it in 1914 and 1915.

Then play was suspended because of the Great War and was not resumed until 1921. U. N. B. won it that year and last year Mount A. were winners again.

## The N. B. & P. E. I. League Executive Disallowed the Protest; Bathurst Appeals

Chatham Declared Winner of Northern Section at Moncton Meeting

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 27.—At the meeting of the executive of the N. B. & P. E. I. Amateur Hockey League here yesterday the protest entered by Shediac in the recent game here against Chatham in the Northern section of the league was not allowed. This leaves Chatham the winner of that section.

Dr. A. Sterling, president of the N. B. & P. E. I. League, who returned last night from the meeting of the executive at Moncton, said this morning that Bathurst had given notice of an appeal from the decision of the league executive and he presumed the matter would be carried to the Maritime Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. He said he had invited President Covey to attend yesterday's meeting to hear the evidence submitted, but he had said he was too much engaged with skating matters at St. John to do so.

Dr. Sterling said that Chatham have been declared winners of the Northern section by the league executive, would go on with the play-off and would play at Charlottetown on Wednesday evening. The motion disallowing the Shediac protest was moved by Vice-President H. M. Wood, of Shediac, seconded by Secretary-Treasurer Stokes, of Sussex, and Vice-President G. T. O'Brien, of Chatham, spoke in favor of it also, the President therefore not being called upon to vote.

Statements made in connection with the appointment of Anthony Veno, of Chatham, as referee of the disputed game, which Chatham won by a score of 10 to 3, were not borne out by the evidence as presented at the Moncton meeting, according to Dr. Sterling. The version of the matter given yesterday was that Mayor Kelly of Shediac agreed upon behalf of the Chatham Club to the appointment of Veno in a conference with representatives of the Chatham Club; then G. T. O'Brien, of Chatham, as vice-president of the Northern section, was called upon and asked to confirm the appointment, and he demurred at first on account of Veno's connection with the Chatham Club, but finally consented when advised that both clubs had agreed and that the referee originally appointed was not available. Later on, it was stated, the Shediac players objected to Veno acting and it was said that Mayor Kelly, in agreeing to his appointment, did not know that he was a member of the Chatham team.

The league executive took the position that under the circumstances the situation had to be met and upheld Vice-President O'Brien's action.

**Nova Scotia Play-Off.**

Windsor, N. S., Feb. 27.—Windsor, 1922 champions of Nova Scotia and this year's Valley League victors, won from Lunenburg, holders of the South Shore title in the first playoff game for the western Nova Scotia championship here last night, 8 to 0.

**Quebec Allan Cup Play.**

Montreal, Feb. 27.—Nationals are the 1923 champions of the Montreal City Hockey League and will represent the organization in the Allan Cup elimination, playing their first game in the titular series here Thursday against the Three Rivers teams, champions of the Province of Quebec League.
