## BOTH RESIGNATIONS EFFECTIVE IN MAY

U. N. B. Loses Services of Both Professors of the Forestry School.

Following closely upon announcement of the resignation of Professor B. B. Claridge as Assistant Professor of Forestry at the University of New Brunswick, to engage in private forestry work with the Hannam Mill Pulp & Paper Company at Matane, P. Q., comes the announcement of the resignation of Professor A. V. S. Pulling, B.S., as head of the Forestry School.

Professor Pulling is leaving the University to enter the employ of the Zoology Department of his Alma Mater, the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse University, where he will commence his new duties in September. Professor Pulling's resignation will not become effective until the end of the present academic year in May, the same time that

# PLED GUILTY TO THEFT CHARGES AND WERE REMANDED

Will Be Sentenced Monday for Break at Cardigan Station on Monday Night.

## ELECTED TRIAL BY POLICE MAGISTRATE

Arrest Made by C. P. R. Official Following Arrival Here Yesterday Afternoon.

Electing to be tried before Police Magistrate Limerick in the police court yesterday afternoon when arraigned on charges of theft and breaking and entering the C. P. R. station at Cardigan on Monday night, William Smith, aged 22, and Albert Sargent, aged 18, giving their address as Boston, Mass., pleaded guilty to the charges. Sentence was deferred until Monday morning. In the meantime the prisoners were remanded to jail.

Smith and Sargent were arrested at the C. P. R. station here yesterday afternoon by T. P. Ritson, of the C. P. R. Department of Investigation, St. John, following his arrival in the city to investigate the circumstances of the break which took place at Cardigan. One of the prisoners was wearing a pair of boots stolen from the office at Cardigan, while a ticket punch and some few cents taken from the till were also found in their possession.

Following the break which was reported to St. John by the agent at Cardigan, it was reported that two strangers had been seen by trainmen at Cardigan. Chief of Police Nathaniel Jones was asked to keep a look out here for these strangers, but in the meantime Mr. Ritson arrived here and while on his way to confer with Chief Jones discovered the young men in the vicinity of the C. P. R. station.

# CASE FROM NORTH SHORE IS HEARD

Six Dollars All the Appellant Could Expect to Win if Successful.

## HEARING OF \$30,000 APPEAL COMMENCED

Canadian Drug Company's Appeal From Mr. Justice Barry's Decision Started.

Time is money, and it will cost the parties involved in the case of James Stothard vs. James Russell, an appeal from the Northumberland County Court, more money than the six dollars involved for the time which was occupied in the hearing of this case in the Court of Appeal yesterday afternoon.

Considerable surprise was expressed by Mr. Justice White, when, during the argument, it was pointed out that the appellant could only hope to gain a matter of some six dollars without taking into account the costs of appealing the case, in the event of his being successful in his appeal. But it was pointed out to the court that there was a greater consideration at stake, that of obtaining justice, according to the appellant's point of view.

The original suit was tried before Judge McLatchey at Newcastle, when Stothard sued Russell for hire of horses and damage to sleds and harness used in logging operations. A verdict for the plaintiff amounting to \$34.50 was awarded, while the defendant was awarded \$18.55 on a counter claim. The defendant is the appellant in the suit, and was represented by Robert Murray, K. C., of Chatham, (Continued on page three.)
