

POLICE HAD BUSY TIME.

And a Very Long Court This Morning and the Result.

Smith House on Cannon Street Raided Again Last Night.

Two Months for Interfering With Officer Yesterday.

Yesterday morning Constables Duncan and Emmerson had a pitch-in with the crowd watching the road race at the corner of MacNab and Market streets, and the general opinion is that they got the best of the struggle. John Teeple, 537 Hughson street north, was arrested by Constable Duncan, accused of cursing and swearing, and was in Police Court this morning.

People refused to go with the constable, and Duncan tried to handcuff him and a struggle ensued. Emmerson went to his assistance, and the two were buffeted about by the crowd, but all the time retaining their prisoners.

One man, who was very lively, and landed several kicks on Emmerson, was arrested by that officer. Teeple pulled away from Duncan at this point, but the wagon came along with Constable Brannon then, and the men were rushed to the cells. The second man arrested was a Welshman named Thomas Ellis, who lives on Arthur avenue. A. W. Logie appeared for Teeple, who pleaded guilty to being drunk and disorderly, and was fined \$5. He was committed for trial on charges of assaulting Constable Duncan and escaping from custody.

Ellis denied striking Emmerson, and said that he only tried to persuade the officers to let Teeple alone and see if he would go quietly. The Magistrate found him guilty, and sent him to jail for two months.

Oswald Haird, Brantford, was arrested by Constable McLean, and when searched at No. 3 Police Station he yielded up a revolver. The Magistrate fined him \$20 for carrying it, and allowed the drunk charge to drop.

The case of Thomas Gallagher, Toronto, charged with the theft of \$63, a watch and a chain, is for some time, George Paris was the complainant. Geo. S. Kerr, acting for Gallagher, pleaded not guilty, and elected to take a summary trial. Paris said he met Gallagher on the street, and having known him before he came to Hamilton, they went uptown to get a drink. They had two drinks and then went to the Wentworth Club. Gallagher went and bought a jug of whiskey. Gallagher asked Paris for his money, as he seemed to be getting drunk, so witness handed over the \$63 and the watch and chain. Later asked Gallagher for his valuables, and witness gave them to him, but he asked for \$10 short. He got the \$10 by asking for it. When he got to the Chinese restaurant on King William street, witness searched his pockets for his money, but could not find it, and he straightaway accused Gallagher of stealing it. Gallagher started for the door, but he hit him and called the police. Gallagher started to run, but Sgt. Pinch and Constable Campaign caught him and searched him. A gold chain was found on him, which was identified as the stolen one, by the witness.

Gallagher admitted that he had asked for the money, and had got it, but said he gave it all back. The reason he ran when the fight started in the restaurant was that he had been in "chink joints" before when fights started. The Magistrate found Gallagher guilty. He said it looked to him as if he had started out to drug the complainant and get his money. The prisoner was remanded a week for an examination as to his past. William Doyle, charged with being a vag, was sent to Central for six months. Ed. Smith, 127 Cannon street west, charged with vagrancy, was remanded till Monday, and bail was fixed at \$100 cash. He was arrested last night in a raid on his wife's establishment at the above address.

Margie Smith, Pearl Lyons and Violet Smith were gathered about 11:20 last night by a squad of police under Sergeant Pinch. At court this morning M. J. O'Reilly appeared for Mrs. Smith, and pleaded not guilty. She was found guilty, and remanded till to-morrow for sentence. The inmates will also appear to-morrow.

James Henderson, Macklin street, was fined \$5 for being drunk and disorderly. A charge of assault preferred against him by William Elliott was dropped.

William Knapman was fined \$2 for distributing advertising bills to school children.

John McElroy, 136 Cannon street west, was tossing a coin to see if he could kick all policemen at once. It turned out only one, and he got so sore that he called Pete Brannon names. He was fined \$5.

Tom Longboat, the famous runner, was in town on an awful bender yesterday, and was arrested by Constable Myers. He dug out and his \$5 bail was extracted.
