Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

Duties—Six month residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right cannot obtain a pre-emption. He may take a purchased homestead in certain cases. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

Glasgow Students Kick Up More Disturbance.

Riot in Music Hall—Smash Windows and Fight Police.

London, Nov. 15.—Despatches from Glasgow to-night say that the medical students rioted again early in the evening, and after smashing windows, were finally repulsed by the police. Walford Bodie, the alleged mesmerist, was again the object of their hostility. He was billed to appear at the Canterbury Music Hall, and the students turned out en masse. They occupied most of the seats on the main floor, and when it was announced that Bodie, because of illness, had been compelled to leave town, there was a loud cry for him to come upon the stage. When he did not appear and other performers came on they were promptly pelted with eggs till they retired.

The students left the theatre in a body, paraded the streets, smashing windows and defying the police, who at last charged them, arresting a number of the noisiest. The others reassembled and marching westward, indulged in rowdy acts. There were many encounters with the police, who in the end were victorious.
