DEATH OF AN ENGLISH DIVER.—For some days past. A HINT TO SMOKERS.—M. Melsens, a French chemist, has found that tobaccoes from various countries contain micotine in very different proportions. In tobacco from some parts of France there is 7.90 per cent. of nicotine; while Havana tobacco contains only 2 per cent. He proposes to smokers a way of preserving them from the effects of the alkaloid, by putting into the tube of the pipe or eigar holder a little ball of cotton, impregnated with eitric and traine acids. As the smoke passes through cotton, it will deposit the nicotine therein, in the shape of the tennate and citrate.
