speaking at Hamilton today at a luncheon specially arranged to give the leader of the opposition in the House of Commons an opportunity of expressing the views of official Liberalism regarding the Transvaal crisis, said that he had had shut the door upon further negotiations. "Great Britain," he continued, "has not made her demands, as a sovereign power, but in virtue of international law and as the power responsible for the well-being of South Africa. If the Transvaal government, which is the responsible government of the country, is to be the secretary of state for the colonies on Sept. 8, through fear and suspicion regarding a possible attack upon their independence, the question of the Duke of Devonshire (and president of the council of ministers), and Sir Matthew White Ridley (secretary of state for the home department), constitute assurances which ought to strengthen suspicion and fear. These assurances are quite authoritative as they are made by a member of the cabinet and bind the honor of the government and the country. They ought to open the way to an agreement."

Gen. J. R. Obern, of New York, has been appointed the special representative in the United States of this republic to work in the interest of peace. The government is reducing official salaries on a sliding scale. These reductions have had their effect. The salaries of the members of the House of Representatives are reduced 10 per cent. A similar reduction of 10 per cent. has been made in the salaries of the members of the Senate.

New York, Oct. 6.—A special to the Herald from Boston says: "It was learned today that sixty-seven trans-Atlantic steamers have been chartered by the British admiralty to transport troops and supplies to South Africa. That the Columbian and Chicago, of the Furness Line had been taken was confirmed today. It is also said that the Oakmore, of the Johnson Line, will, upon the discharge of her cargo in London, be turned over to the government. Mr. Wylie, the local agent of the line, has received no official advice of the charter. The steamer Monticome, of the White Star Line, has been taken, also the new Allan Line steamer Bavaria, which has made two trips to Montreal. Freight has advanced nearly 50 per cent. on account of the removal of so much tonnage from the Atlantic seaboard and there is every indication of a still greater advance. Grain charters closed Saturday at 2-3 pence per bushel and fixtures made on a basis of 4d. per bushel. The rate to Liverpool Saturday was 2 1/4 pence, while yesterday 3 1/2 pence per bushel was quoted. It was understood that some of the Elder-Dempster steamers, plying in the Montreal service, are among the fleet taken by the British government.

Serious Fire at Sussex.

The great conflagration which ever occurred in Sussex broke out Friday night at 11 o'clock in the Hotel "The Queen" on the corner of King Street and the sea. Despite their efforts the flames spread, and soon the hotel was on fire. A high wind fanned the flames that spread rapidly. The I. C. R. station was on fire several times, but was saved by the heroic efforts of the firemen. All the horses were saved from the Queen hotel stable, but the wagon and shafts were destroyed. Mr. Doherty had no insurance.

The fire worked to the east and burnt the handsome residence formerly the property of the late Sheriff Freeze, but now owned by Mr. Doherty and used in connection with his hotel.

The Depot House caught shortly after the Queen and soon burned to the ground with a large part of its contents. The handsome new brick block built by James B. Byrne was the next to be gathered into the jaws of the devouring elements. In a short time this structure was a mass of ruins.

The following buildings were destroyed: Queen Hotel, Depot House, the late Sheriff Freeze's House, F. W. Flower's house, and the residence owned by Gen. Morton.

The Queen Hotel and annex was occupied by and was the property of Mr. P. Doherty. In the Depot House building besides the hotel itself the following were burnt out: B. J. Sharp, druggist, and Miller Bros., butchers.

In the Byrne block Andrew Price occupied the top flat. On the ground floor was the general store of Wesley Baird, Chapman & Lamb's restaurant and Berry's barber shop.

The Morton building was occupied by Mell Scott as a dwelling and grocery store and Robert Johnson, barber.

The Fowler building the W. H. Johnson Company had stored a number of pianos, insured for \$1,500.
